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A SPLENDID SUCCESS

Our Farmers' Institute Was Liberally Attended and Greatly Enjoyed By the Farmers.

Dr. James Withycombe, Prof. Kinsey and Lewis, of the Oregon Agricultural College, and Hon. E. T. Judd, of Salem, concluded a very successful Farmers' Institute in this city last Saturday. Through a misunderstanding the session of Friday afternoon was not so liberally attended by farmers as were the later sessions, though a fair audience was present. The session of Friday evening and of the morning and afternoon sessions on Saturday were largely attended and those present manifested their deep interest in the subjects discussed by giving the various speakers their undivided attention.

Horticulture was the subject of the Friday afternoon lecture by Prof. C. I. Lewis. Prof. Lewis gave his entire talk to the apple orchard. He advised the orchardist as to the pruning and training of the tree; cautioned against planting trees too closely together, and advised spraying four times during the Spring and Summer, which should produce 95 per cent of sound fruit.

The Friday evening session partook more of the entertainment nature. A musical number by the Wesely Orchestra being first in order. Vocal choruses by local talent, the theme of which seemed to be "We're here because we're here." Hon. E. T. Judd, of Salem, was then introduced and spoke in a very happy vein without any subject being assigned. He addressed himself, principally, to farmers boys and girls. He said that farmers should make the home pleasant for the boys and girls, should encourage the reading habit, by supplying plenty of reading matter in the way of books, papers, magazines, etc.; that farmers' boys should be taught how to cook as well as other work etc. His central idea was, that the farm home should be made a pleasant place as well as a place to work from early morning 'till late at night. The stereopticon was then arranged and an illustrated lecture, given by Dr. Withycombe. Particular attention was given to the dairy cow. Specimens of all breeds were shown and their valuable points for dairy purposes was emphasized.

Saturday morning's session was taken up, principally, by Prof. Kinsey, upon the subject of "Plant food," which was illustrated with a chart. Using a word of product the exact amount of the various elements of the soil which is extracted to produce was shown, and which class of products impoverished the soil the most rapidly. The Professor stated, that while clover and vetch consumed about the same quantity of nitrogen, potash, etc., that the wheat plant did, they gathered those properties largely from the atmosphere; while wheat extracted them, almost exclusively from the soil. Prof. Kinsey's lecture was listened to very closely. Dr. Withycombe concluded the morning session with a few minutes talk on the value of organization to the farmer, and what is to be gained by the interchange of ideas. He urged the importance of the effort to organize a Fair society, stating that it would be a great aid in facilitating the improvement in the breeding of stock.

The afternoon session was consumed principally by Hon. E. T. Judd in a talk about draft horses and the care of the colt. Mr. Judd is a horseman and knows whereof he speaks, when the subject is "The horse." He stated that the draft horse was the money maker; that it cost no more to raise him and he was less expensive to fit for market. He said that we should not breed horses for our own use, but for the other fellows use etc.

Dr. Withycombe was then called out talking very entertainingly for a short time, when the meeting was resolved into a sort of question bureau, the people interlocking and Dr. Withycombe answering. Several very essential points were drawn out by these questions. A vote of thanks was tendered, by the audience to Dr. Withycombe, Prof. Kinsey and Lewis and Mr. Judd, for their presence, after which the Institute adjourned.

T. J. Munkers met the speakers in the morning with his carriage at Munkers and brought them into town. Mayor Miller, who was on the program for the address of welcome, flunked completely, and was not present at any of the sessions. Likewise the Scio band that was programed morning and afternoon, on Saturday, for music.

A good many farmers who were expected, did not attend. Probably because they did not realize the importance of the meeting and the good that it would do.

While the attendance was quite large, the next Farmers' Institute will bring out a much larger crowd. Farmers can now see the importance of such meetings and will be on hand next time. At our next Institute we should have a question box, so that all who are too timid, may place any question they desire answered, in the box.
