#### THE SCIO FAIR.

Scio will have a three-days fair next fall. The ground plans for the same was laid last Saturday at a most enthusiastic meeting of the share holders at Firemen's hall, in this city.  
The meeting was called to order by temporary president, A. G. Prill. After the reading of and adoption the minutes of a previous meeting, President Prill stated that 111 shares of stock had been subscribed for. This being more than the minimum amount required, the meeting proceeded to effect permanent organization. Committee on constitution and bylaws reported constitution, which after being read was unanimously adopted. The following board of directors was then elected: M. C. Gaines, Lee Bilyeu, J. A. Bilyeu, Carl Middelstadt, A. E. Randall and John Wesely. Officers elected: A. G. Prill, president; T. M. Holt, vice-president; T. L. Dugger, secretary; W. M. Phillips, treasurer.  
President Prill called the first meeting of board of directors for March 9.  
The Scio Stock and Agricultural Fair starts out under most favorable circumstances. While it is not expected that our fair will rival the state subsidized exhibition down at Salem, it is expected that it will give a complete exhibition of the stock and agricultural interests of the forks of the Santian. The board of directors will convene at the SANTIAN News office on Saturday, when bylaws will be adopted, arrangements for grounds be effected etc.
