#### Daring American Acrobats With The Norris & Rowe Circus. They are More Original Than the Foreigners

Upon triple silver bars placed at the extreme top of the tent, these intrepid acrobats accomplish a series of graceful and difficult feats. Even when the horizontal bars are placed upon the ground one can appreciate the agility and cleverness of the bar performers but when the same bars are placed high in the air, the dangerous nature of their hazardous calling is at once apparent, but it is a beautiful act that is always applauded. Another splendid American act is that of the Banvard troupe of young men and women aerial acrobats who do a "flying act," passing each other in long graceful flights through the air.
