DEFENSE WILL BE INSANITY.
N. M. Newport, of Lebanon, passed through Albany today for Bellingham, Wash., to appear as attorney in the defense of R. F. Walker, who is charged with murder in the first degree for killing his wife on June 24 last. The defense will be hereditary insanity, and that the defendant was insane when he shot and killed his wife and shot himself.
A large number of witnesses have been subpoenaed in Oregon and will go to Bellingham, nearly four hundred miles, and testify in the case. The witnesses to go from Oregon are the following: Dr. S. P. Wallace and J. R. Baltimore, of this city; Dr. J. C. Booth, C. W. Bogart and John H. Wallace, Lebanon; W. S. Walker, E. L. Walker, Martin Sitter and S. T. McFeeley, of Tallman; John R. Thompson and Lizzie Thompson, of Dallas; Moss Walker, of Falls City; Emanuel Irwin, of Salem, and R. M. Lewis, of Eugene. The trial is set for Sept. 24, and will last a week.—Albany Herald.

Scio, Oregon, Sept. 10, 1907.
THE TREMENDOUS: Yours of September 6th at hand, requesting my views in regard to the effect of the increase of rail rate on lumber. It has had the effect already of putting down the price of lumber \$2.00 per thousand feet to us, and if the rate really goes into effect we will be compelled to shut down our mill. Wages are higher than any mill can afford to pay and suffer a reduction in lumber prices. Hoping your efforts will be productive of much good along these lines, we are,
