has not complied with the law, he had better do so at once, if he can.

Lee Clark arrived in Lebanon Tuesday afternoon with the remains of his 3-year-old daughter, who was born at death at a hop yard near Independence Monday night. He had been to the hop yard with his family and were about to come home. Mrs. Clark had set the little girl on a seat near the fire, and when she returned the child was in flames and so badly burned that she died in about six hours. They could only wrap the body of the little one in a blanket, and thus they brought it to Lebanon, where it was prepared for burial, which took place the following day in the family burying ground near Lebanon.

TWO PIONEERS PASS A VAY.

To record the death of two of Scio's pioneer business men is our melancholy duty this week. Death from disease or old age is the lot of all and a fate to which we all must bow sooner or later; but to be reminded so vividly, twice in the space of one short week that death is the end of physical life, and that any one of us may be the next victim, must be a source of serious reflection.

John S. Morris, one of Scio's oldest pioneer citizens and business men, is no more. His death occurred on Sunday night, September 29. For a year or more Johnny, as his friends familiarly called him, had been a sufferer from stomach trouble and heart disease. At times he was confined to his home, but would recover sufficiently to take up and look after his business affairs, but each attack left his constitution more

impaired. The last attack, commencing two or three months ago, resulted in his almost continuous confinement at his home and the gradual but sure tragic ending.

The funeral occurred at the Baptist church on Tuesday, October 1, and was conducted by Rev. W. Woodley. Owing to the absence of his oldest daughter, Mrs. Emma Cyrus, the burial was delayed to the morning of October 2, when it occurred in the family burial plot in Franklin Butte cemetery.

John S. Morris was born in Benton county, Mo., on July 19, 1842, making his age at the time of death 65 years, 2 months and 11 days. Crossed the plains with his parents in 1853, the family settling a short distance southeast of Scio. His first work in Scio was as clerk in J. M. John's store, and later on engaged in merchandizing on his own account for several years. He succeeded D. P. M. son in the drug business in Scio, in which he engaged continuously until 1907. Since that time he was engaged in diversified fruit raising.

He was married to Miss Sarah F. Queener, of Linn county, in 1866, who, together with a large family of sons and daughters, mourn his loss. Two of the children had preceded him to the Great Beyond, a daughter in infancy, and a son, Fred, who died in Alaska. Two sons, Dean and Rola, and three daughters, reside in Scio. Mrs. Emma Cyrus, Mrs. Ollie McDonald and Miss Bessie. Mrs. Addie Peery resides in Springfield. Mrs. May Jones in Lebanon. Mrs. Anne Ekhardt in Portland and Frank Morris in Estacada.

Politically, J. S. was a prohibitionist and was one of the leading members and managers of that party's interest in Linn county. Many years ago he was a candidate for sheriff on the Independent ticket against L. C. Rice on the Democratic. People who know say he was elected by two or three votes, but was juggled out of the election by the Democratic politicians.

Socially, he was one of the most genial, kind-hearted and jovial citizens of Scio. He was very fond of playing harmless jokes on his friends and neighbors, and seemed to enjoy a joke equally well if it was on himself. He seemed to be a friend to every one, especially the young boys and girls.

In religion he was a member of the Presbyterian church. Hospitable—his home was ever a haven of rest to visiting clergymen, as well as any one who came to his door. He lived a consistent Christian as he understood his duty, and was ever one of the chief supporters of the church.

In his home life, he was an affectionate husband, a kind father and an accommodating neighbor. In every walk of life he did his duty as he saw and understood it.

EX-SHERIFF IRA C. DICKEY

Was born in Mercer county, Penn., in 1832, making his age, at the time of his death, 75 years, 2 months and 4 days. Crossed the plains in 1852 and settled at Santiam City, near Jefferson. Was married to Miss Francisco Miller in 1855. To this union were born Mrs. Elva Upham, of Portland; Cortes Dickey, deceased a number of years ago; Mrs. Minnie A. Froman, of Downs, Wash.; Mrs. Melba Baylies, residence not known, but who is supposed to have perished in the San Francisco earthquake; Mrs. Alice Lucas, of Chehalis, Wash., and Frank Dickey, of Portland. The mother died several years ago and is buried in Franklin Butte cemetery.

His second marriage was to Mrs. Louisa Phillips. To this marriage one son, Cassel, was born, but whose death occurred in Albany several years ago.

About 28 years ago I. C. was elected

sheriff of Linn county and served a two years' term. Afterwards he engaged in business in Albany, Portland and Salem for several years. During the Penneyer administration, he served as captain of the guard at the state penitentiary.

Four or five years ago he removed to Scio, where he has continued to reside until his death, which occurred at 4 a. m. October 1. The funeral was conducted on the following day by the Ma some fraternity, of which he had been a member of many years' standing.

A THING OF BEAUTY.

"A thing of beauty is a joy forever," so says the poet. This being true, there is a great deal of joy ahead for Scioans; for the sample building erected by the Trappist Fathers' mill will certainly be a "thing of beauty." The building is a cottage, 12x16 feet in size, constructed of the best of material and built by our famous master builder, N. J. Morrison. The paint was donated by the popular Lowe Bros. Paint Co. and was applied by E. J. Daley. When fully completed, which will be the case in the next few days, the Scio fair grounds can boast of a handsome building that is on the state fair grounds. The building is to be the secretary's office at each fair. The kindness and enterprise of the Trappist Fathers sets an example that we hope will be followed by many of our business men before the occurrence of next year's fair.
