SUES FOR DIVORCE

According to Mrs. C. A. Knauf, of Scio, who, Wednesday, through her attorneys, Weatherford & Wyatt, filed a suit for divorce against Lewis Knauf, her husband had a disagreeable and annoying habit of swearing at her and making threats against her. On several occasions, so Mrs. Knauf alleges, the man who had sworn to "love and cherish" her, shook his fist in her face and told her to leave the house and not return. The plaintiff alleges that on the 12th of last October, the defendant even said, "I will kill you," and leaving him Mrs. Knauf called her son and daughter to her assistance. On another occasion it is asserted that Mr. Knauf told his wife that he would follow her to her grave, and again advised her to take her bundle and go. Mrs. Knauf desires the care of her two children, and the custody of three minor children, and a one-third interest in certain described real property belonging to the defendant. The couple were married March 29, 1885, in Minnesota.—Albany Herald.

HOUSE AND BARN BURNED.

Last Saturday night the farm house and large stock barn belonging to Delbert Bellinger, of two or three miles northeast of Waterloo, was burned. The dwelling was unoccupied but the barn contained a large amount of hay, which to the owner, this year, is a severe loss. The fire is attributed to incendiary origin. Bad blood has existed in the neighborhood since the Perkins-Bellinger assault case of last summer. Mr. Bellinger believes some of his enemies did the burning. The loss is placed at \$3000. The buildings were uninsured.
