Must Pay Up.

Owing to a late ruling of the Postal
 Department delinquent subscribers to

Conferred With Manager O'Brien.

On Monday a committee from the
 Scio Commercial club was in Portland
 and interviewed Manager O'Brien, of
 the Harriman lines in Oregon, relative
 to extending a branch of the Southern
 Pacific's Woodburn-Springfield line, in-
 to Scio.

The committee consisting of T. L.
 Dogger, chairman, A. G. Prill, E. C.
 Peery, R. M. Cain, C. A. Warner, L.
 T. Parker and Father Henry Pelletan,
 was courteously received by Mr.
 O'Brien.

After the chairman of the committee
 had presented the case in which sta-
 tistics showing the amount of business
 the branch line would probably do, Mr.
 O'Brien questioned various members of
 the committee relative to matters under
 consideration; which showed that he
 had a thorough comprehension of the
 subject.

Dr. A. G. Prill had prepared some
 data bearing on the subject and which
 Mr. O'Brien preserved for future refer-
 ence. He also stated that he would
 send a man to Scio to look the matter
 up, in the immediate future.

The committee also visited the
 Electric line people and presented the same
 facts for consideration. The committee
 was cordially received. After canvass-
 ing the situation pretty thoroughly the
 committee was promised a visit from
 the Electric people in the immediate
 future.

The committee feels greatly encour-
 aged and while no definite promises
 were made, the enterprise is looked up-
 on favorably by both systems.

Safe Blown Open.

Last night unknown parties broke in
 to the Southern Pacific depot at Leba-
 non and blew open the safe with dynamite.
 The robber or robbers succeeded in
 blowing off the outer door but failed
 to penetrate the inner door. The force
 of the explosion blew the heavy iron
 door across the room where it struck
 the wall. The robbers first drilled hole
 below the combination and then insert-
 ed the explosive, packing it with mud.
 Entrance to the depot was effected by
 way of a window after the robbers had
 failed to open the door by drilling a
 hole just below the lock. This railroad
 night watch says he heard a noise like
 an explosion about 3 o'clock this morn-
 ing which was probably the charge set
 off by the robbers. Sheriff Smith was
 in Lebanon this morning investigating,
 but reports an absence of clues.—Tues-
 day's Albany Herald.
