THE PRIMARY ELECTION

Statement No. 1 Vindicated in the Nomination of Hon. H. M. Cake.

The Primary election of last Friday occurred without a jar of discord throughout the state, nevertheless in many instances the contests between candidates for nomination grew quite warm.

Hon. H. M. Cake won out over Senator Fulton by the handsome majority of approximately 3000. Senator Fulton found to his cost that a majority of the people of Oregon does not believe that Francis J. Heney is a liar. Mr. Cake's campaign was conducted exclusively on Statement No. 1 lines, and his triumph at the polls is complimentary to his judgment of the temper of the people.

If the state officers there was but slight competition among candidates excepting for railroad commissioners. For this office Clyde B. Acheson was victorious in the second district and Thomas Campbell in the first. For congress, W. C. Hawley of the first and W. R. Ellis of the second district are the nominees.

For supreme judge R. S. Bean had no competitor in either party.

Governor Chamberlain for U. S. senator and J. J. Whitney for congressman were written in as the nominees of the Democratic party and were nominated unanimously.

IN LINN COUNTY

There were contests in the Republican party for but few places. The legislative ticket is Editor Brown of the Brownsville Times, E. E. Upmeyer, of Harrisburg and F. H. Porter of Shedd, Y. G. Freeman of Albany, G. G. Bell of Harrisburg and Mr. Blanchard of Brownsville are the defeated candidates. County judge, J. N. Duncan. Clerk, J. W. Miller. Recorder, Grant Froman. Treasurer, W. W. Francis. Assessor, D. B. McKnight. Surveyor, Albert L. Goddes. Commissioners, T. J. Butler and O. H. Russell.

The Democrats have nominated for the legislature, I. A. Munkers, of Albany, J. M. Philpott of Harrisburg and Thomas Brandon of Halsey. County judge, C. H. Stewart. Sheriff, D. S. Smith. Clerk B. M. Payne. Recorder, S. H. Goin. Treasurer, G. C. Turner. Assessor, I. M. Taylor. School Supt, W. L. Jackson. Commissioners, D. D. Hackleman and Peter Bither.

DIED.

McDONALD—At the family home in Jordan, Oregon, after a lingering illness, Benjamin Franklin McDonald; aged 63 years, 6 months and 13 days.

Mr. McDonald, who was one of Jordan's reliable citizens, was born at Butte Creek, Clackamas county, on July 4, 1847 and when quite young came with his parents to the vicinity of Scio where he grew to manhood.

In his young vigorous manhood he removed to Montana, then to Wyoming. He removed to Malheur county, Oregon in 1876 from whence he returned to Scio in 1897 and onto his Jordan farm in 1898, where he continued to reside until his death.

In 1887 he was united in marriage to Miss Alice A. Oak, of Del, Malheur Co., Oregon. To this union there have been born ten children, six sons and four daughters who, with their mother survive the deceased together with three sisters and two brothers.

The funeral and interment occurred at Bilyeu Den cemetery.
