He has also, raised the assessed value of railroads from \$5000 or \$6000 to \$30,000 per mile. Every year he has had a set to with lawyers representing these timber lands and railroads and has resisted every argument or threat they brought to bear to cause him to lower the valuation placed upon those properties. In all cases, in the end, the full amount of taxes were paid. A man less firm in his conviction of right, or less honest in his eloquence of those lawyers.
