A RICH MINE.

Mexican Mine Limited, the Stayton-Scio company, of which W. Ehlert, of this city is president and G. L. Brown, of Stayton secretary, held a business meeting at Stayton on Wednesday of last week; at which time R. Stamp, of Stayton was elected manager. Mr. Stamp will, at once go to Mexico and assume active charge of the mine.

It was also ordered that the working force at the mine be doubled and the necessary hoisting machinery be installed at once. The shaft has already been sunk 70 feet through ore the entire distance. At the surface the ore mill tested a fraction over \$18 per ton, the ledge being but two feet wide. At the present depth the ore tests \$26 per ton and the ledge has grown to be 9 feet in width. It is the purpose to sink the shaft about 20 feet from the surface; then to cross-cut. It is thought this can be done in six months. If the ledge continues to grow wider and richer as the shaft is being sunk, by the time the 200 feet level is reached the company will have a bonanza in sight. It is the purpose of the company to install a large battery of stamps next winter when it is expected dividends on stock will commence.

A great many so-called mines are a fake proposition and money expended for development purposes only goes to develop the size of the purse of the promoter. The Mexican Mine Limited is not this kind of a mine. Paying ore has been found from the surface down and everything goes to show that the Scio and Stayton people have a very rich mine. Charles and John Wesely, of this city, have just returned from a visit to the mines. They found everything even better than represented.

Democratic State Convention.

The Democratic state convention was held in Portland, on Tuesday of this week. O. P. Coshov, of Roseburg, was selected as chairman.

The presidential electors nominated were—E. S. J. McAllister, of Multnomah county; Samuel White, of Baker county; Bernard Daley, of Lake county; O. P. Coshov, of Douglas county.

Delegates to the National convention at large—M. A. Miller, of Linn county; John Manning, of Multnomah county; James H. Beeman, of Jackson county; J. D. Slater, of Union county. First congressional district—Dan Fry, of Marion county; L. M. Travis, of Lane county. Second congressional district—D. M. Watson, of Multnomah county; C. K. Henry, of Multnomah county.

The convention instructed the delegates to vote for William J. Bryan, so long as he was a candidate, endorsed the Initiative and Referendum and the Direct Primary laws and the administration of Governor Chamberlain.

Foot Slashed.

Ernest Titus may be written down as one of the unfortunates. He had a severe attack of typhoid fever, last fall, from the effects of which he has but just recovered. He had been engaged in cutting wood but for about one week when the accident occurred. In cutting down a tree he struck a careless blow, the ax glanced and landed on one of his feet, splitting the shoe and foot. The second toe was split into the body of the foot, slashing off a portion of the bone. The wound bled most profusely. Ernest was removed to his boarding place at Crabtree and Dr. Prill, of this city, called to dress the wound. The severed bone was removed, the wound stitched up and the foot dressed. It will be several weeks before Ernest can again resume his work.
