ranges about 11 and 12 cents, Scio wool  
growers may consider themselves very  
fortunate.

C. A. Posvar, late from Nebraska and  
who bought the Pitchford farm some  
time ago, arrived last week with his  
family and two carloads of stock and  
farming machinery. Mr. Posvar ap-  
pears to be an energetic up-to-date  
farmer and will be a valuable acqui-  
sition to our community.

Work is in progress this week by  
both the Scio Milling Co., and the city  
of Scio on repairs to the water power  
for each of the plants. Large quanti-  
ties of muck, such as makes the over-  
flow of the Nile river in Africa valuable  
to the agricultural interests of that  
country, were removed from the ditch.  
The lower end of the race had become  
so filled up.

The Scio hotel has again changed  
hands, Mr. James Russell retiring and  
Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Abbott and Miss  
Abba Powell becoming the new lessees.  
Mrs. Abbott and Miss Powell are  
known to be first-class cooks and Billy  
for roustabout, hashlinger and land-  
lord combined is sure to be a success.  
Mr. Russell has not yet stated what he  
intends to do.

On Tuesday afternoon a number of  
young men and boys were swimming  
near the Lebanon wagon bridge, An-  
drew Gorman got into deep water and  
called for help, Ira Goodman went to  
his assistance. Gorman finally man-  
aged to get out, but Goodman was  
drowned, the body being recovered later  
in the evening. Goodman was a paper  
mill employe and a member of the Leba-  
non base ball team.

for the better appearance. The repairs  
have been general outside and in, in-  
cluding neat picket fencing. If other

**Again Scio Goes Down.**

Those Lebanon ball tossers came over  
again last Sunday and administered  
another dose of defeat medicine to our  
Scio aggregation. Indeed it looks as  
though Lebanon had found a team it  
could defeat and she does not seem in-  
clined to let up in any particular. To  
add to our humiliation, both defeats  
were administered on the home grounds.  
The match was first arranged to be  
played at Lebanon; but later in the  
week, at Lebanon's request, the game  
was switched to Scio. Lebanon had  
greatly strengthened her team over that  
of the week previous. As a matter of  
fact there was but one of her team who  
belongs to Lebanon, the other eight  
coming from Albany, Corvallis, Jeffers-  
on, Salem and Portland.

Scio, also, had strengthened up some-  
what, playing four men not belonging  
to the team. Unfortunately the im-  
ported pitcher was not in good form  
and though the support given him was  
excellent Scio was held down to two  
measly runs while Lebanon galloped  
over the home plate with five.

Considerable money changed hands at  
the close of the game; though much  
more would have been wagered if Scio  
bettors could have found takers. It  
was stated that the Lebanon boys had  
bet heavily and lost at Brownsville a  
few days before when the Lebanon and  
Brownsville teams had hooked up and  
for this reason were shy in the betting  
ring at Sunday's game.

games, as good, perhaps, as are played  
by any amateur teams in the state, and  
if advertised properly, will be liberally  
patronized.
