Albany Pulls Off a Successful Celebration.

Owing to the fact that no great preparation for the comfort of visitors had been made, Albany's celebrations, until this year, has been slightly out of favor with the public. This time the managing committee prepared for the comfort of the visitors so far as possible, in the way of providing seats in the shade and plenty of ice water for drinking purposes.

Taken as a whole Albany's celebration was a splendid success. The two days of racing furnished an entertainment for all who are fond of turf contests and exhibitions. Arnold's (the merry-go-round man) attractions were at hand to enter into all who cared to see them. Balloon ascensions, high wire performance and a "slide for life" from the court house clock tower, furnished free entertainment for all.

The morning of the 4th was introduced by the booming of cannon (anvils) at sunrise.

At 10 a. m. the parade led by the Corvallis Cadet band marched down First street and to Arnold's "big tent" where the literary exercises were billed to occur. The floats in the parade were particularly fine and well gotten up many of which were worthy of special mention. The Fire Departments two engines, perhaps a hundred horse men and horse women, business floats constituted the first division.

The second division was led by the Elks band, whose gaudy and handsome uniforms to say nothing of their splendid music, would attract attention anywhere. Following the band were, perhaps, 200 of the antiered herd, all of whom carried and twirled a Japanese parasol in unison at the command of their leader. The Albany Elks showed that they are a very strong organization.

Through the courtesy of Arnold, the amusement man, his big tent, capable of seating, thousands, was utilized in which to hold the exercises.

With President Crooks, of Albany college as master of ceremonies, the exercises were begun with stinging "Hail Columbia," followed with prayer by Rev. Elliott; then the singing of "The Red White and Blue," the reading of the Declaration of Independence by Miss Helen V. Crawford and then an address by Congressman Hawley. The address was devoted almost exclusively to the history of the past, reaching back almost to the creation of the world. But little was said of the present day conditions. Mr. Hawley certainly demonstrated the fact that he was very familiar with history, both ancient and modern. This did not interest his audience and nearly one-half of which left the tent before the address was completed.

The afternoon was devoted to sports of various kinds and at different places which divided up the 12,000 to 13,000 people present.

At night fire works along the river presented a very fine sight and was viewed by a very large audience, on the big bridge and along the river bank.

Albany certainly deserves credit for the very comfortable manner in which the large crowd was taken care of. The Forks of the Santiam was liberally represented. One feature was noticeable. Not an intoxicated man, not an accident nor a fight occurred so far as we could learn. If there were any arrests by the police force, we did not hear of it. While everybody seemed to be enjoying themselves, there was no disturbing disorder.

VETERANS WRESTLE.

Scio did not attempt to give a celebration, this year. Owing to the fact that our annual fair is but two months distant, it was thought best to assist other adjoining towns in making the eagle scream. Some 60 to 75 of our citizens went to Albany, a 2000ly number including our High School ball team went to Lacombe and a few celebrated at Lyons, Silverton and Salem, while others went fishing.

Regardless of the fact that Scio was nearly depopulated, the day did not pass sportless, by any means. Mine Host Rossell, of the Scio hotel is a civil war veteran past 61 years old. W. S. Carpenter is also a veteran and has passed his 69th mile post. Both of these old boys boast of the strength and vigor they possess in their declining years and indulged in a boasting stunt in each others presence. As both gentlemen had been athletes and wrestlers in their young manhood and forgetful of their white hairs a wrestling bout was proposed which was promptly accepted. The bout occurred in the hotel bar room and was limited to a single fall. Rossell says he slipped which caused the fall. Carpenter claims the fall was due to his superior wrestling ability. Be that as it may the question of who is the better man is yet unsettled. At all events the bout was the cause of a deal of sport and demonstrates that, at least two of the boys who wore the blue are not yet to be numbered with the "has beens."

Want the old train Service.

The people of Crabtree and adjoining country have made complaint to the R. R. Com. of inadequate railroad service between that place and Tallman, asking for an investigation, and for an order giving the people as far as Crabtree a train service so that they will be able to market the products of the country.

This condition is the result of the high water of 1900-07 washing out the bridge over the south fork of the Santiam, which the Company has not rebuilt because of the impossibility of getting a bridge there that will stand the character of the bank making it a very difficult task.

The commission considers the complaint sufficient to order a hearing, and July 14 at 11 a. m., at Crabtree, has been set for an investigation of the service of the road at this place—Albany Democrat.
