## Farm House Burned.

On Wednesday evening of last week the farm house belonging to Frank Pruitt, of two miles South of Scio, was totally destroyed by fire.

A fire had been started in the kitchen stove preparatory to the evening meal, the family at the time of the discovery of the fire being elsewhere about the house, when a neighbor came and notified them that the roof of the house was afire. Of course all was excitement and hurry. The only means of subduing the fire was with buckets and the fire, when discovered, was beyond control. Most of the household goods in the front part of the house was saved; but the kitchen utensils and clothing and bedding up stairs was destroyed.

We have heard that Mr. Pruitt estimates his loss at \$900. The building was insured for \$200. In addition to the insurance, liberal donations from Mr. Pruitt's neighbors and the citizens of Scio, will mitigate his loss somewhat.
