### A RACING CIRCUIT.

In order that Albany may be properly represented at the convention of horsemen to be held here in August, it is requested that business men who are interested in the establishing of a racing circuit, horsemen, and others meet in the rooms of the Commercial Club on Friday evening, July 31st at 7:30 o'clock, when a temporary organization will be effected and a delegate chosen to represent Albany in the convention.

The establishing of an Amateur Racing Circuit, composed of towns situated in the Willamette Valley, such as Albany, Salem, Eugene, Scio, Hillsboro, Independence, Canby, McMinnville, in conjunction with Portland, is now regarded as certain. Manager Dasset of the Commercial Club in conjunction with Mr. D. O. Woodworth has been in correspondence with the officers of the Riverside Driving Club of Portland, to which organization is due the credit for taking the initiative in establishing the new racing circuit.

The claim of Albany as the logical point for the general meeting place of delegates from the several towns selected to form the circuit was presented by the Commercial Club, and it has been decided to call a convention of delegates representing the horsemen of the various towns and cities, to be held in Albany on or about August 7th, when an organization will be effected, and officers elected.

Mr. A. C. Lohmire, of Portland, is authorized by the Riverside Driving Club to represent them and is empowered to enter into the necessary negotiations with the delegates from the other towns to carry the proposed plan to a successful conclusion.

It is believed that because of the location in this city of the Bailey Race Course, which is admitted by horsemen to be the fastest track in the Pacific Northwest, and because of the geographical situation of Albany as the central point of the Willamette Valley and its commanding pre-eminence as the first railroad center in Oregon, outside of Portland, that this features prominently in the arrangement of the new racing circuit.—Albany Democrat.

### Taken to the Asylum.

Mrs. M. A. Riggie, a professional nurse and mother of Mrs. Ida B. Burden, of West Scio, was taken to Albany on Monday by her son-in-law Mr. Burden, assisted by Mrs. Leroy Gossage to be examined before Judge Duncanson for commitment to the insane asylum at Salem.

Mrs. Riggie has been suffering for several months from a nervous disorder which has become very acute during the past two or three weeks. She was encouraged to board at the Scio hotel and at Mrs. C. A. Knauf's with the hope that constant contact with strangers might, in a measure, mitigate her mental trouble. But the change was unavailing. So it was deemed best to place her under the care of professional alienists and the visit to Judge Duncanson was made to obtain the necessary order.

Mr. Burden will have her placed in a private ward and where she will be given particular care and attention.

### A Disastrous Fire.

Last Friday night the Albany Iron Works were totally destroyed by fire. Moulding had been in progress in the afternoon and, it is thought, a spark had caught in the wall and smoldering did not break out until the evening when all the workmen had gone to their homes. The flames had made such headway that, despite all the fire-department could do, the building and contents were a mass of ruins.

The patterns, of which the Works possess a large and valuable assortment were in the brick warehouse adjoining and were saved. Some of the machinery of the machine shop, while being badly damaged, may be repaired again. The loss is estimated at \$10,000 and the insurance was \$9,500. It is stated the works will be immediately rebuilt.
