Plays Another Shutout.

For the third Sunday in succession, Scio has played shutout ball. While Scio is, doubtless, a stronger team than those which have gone up against her it is but right to say much of her success is due to her splendid battery, Messrs Sherman pitcher and Huddleston catcher. Our visitors simply could not connect with Sherman's twisters. He apparently is as invincible in the ball field as was General Sherman in his famous march to the sea. In Sunday's game he permitted but 79 times at the bat for the visitors and but one hit by which the latter reached the first base. One of the Fairmounts, the visiting team, by being struck with the ball, by fine base running managed to reach third base. In attempting to cross the home plate, back stop Huddleston was too quick for him and Salem's only chance to get a run vanished into very thin air.
