### New School Board Elected.

With the exception of E. C. Peery, an entirely new school board was elected at the special school meeting on last Saturday afternoon. Mr. Peery was elected at the annual meeting in June; yet because of the moving away of Directors T. J. Munkers and Geo E. Rodgers, the special election was thought necessary. Director Peery, as the only member of the old board present, called the meeting to order, and had clerk J. F. Wesely read the published call.

The election of one director to serve for the unexpired term of G. E. Rodgers was declared in order. R. M. Cain was nominated. As there was no other nomination, by motion his election was declared unanimous. A. G. Prill was then nominated and elected in like manner to fill the unexpired term of T. J. Munkers. The question was here raised, that directors elected by acclamation, were not legally elected. A reading of the school law showed that election by ballot only, had been provided for. Chairman Peery then declared the proceedings, so far as the election of directors, off, and instructed the voters to proceed in the election by ballot.

The result of the election was not changed, Messrs Cain and Prill being legally elected by ballot. Now the question arises, Who is chairman of the board? Under the law Director Rodgers was chairman. As R. M. Cain was elected to fill out Mr. Rodgers' unexpired term, and which term will expire next June, the query arises, is Mr. Cain the chairman? On the other hand the law specifically states, the director elected in office shall be the chairman. Mr. Peery was elected before either of the others. So there you are. It might be well to get an opinion from Superintendent Jackson relative to the matter.

### Three Deer Killed near Albany.

Three deer were killed, within a few miles of Albany, within two days, Saturday and Sunday, indicating that the little flocks had come down to the valley either from fright or to get something to drink. The first was by Will Dickinson on the Dickinson farm, mentioned Saturday. Another was killed yesterday at North Lawson, a fine black tailed fellow, on the farm of T. L. Dugger by Ralph Crawford, giving the neighbors some choice venison. The other was near Tallman on the Swank farm by the Swank boys. Hunters who have been up in the mountains have had hard work to make any kind of a killing. But in these cases the deer have come down to the valley for food. —Albany Democrat.

### Business Growing.

Chas Warner, superintendent of the Scio Roller mills informs us that the milling business, in this city, shows an increasing and healthy growth. Wheat has been marketed or stored at the mills, from districts which heretofore, had found a market at other points. Flour sales, also, are reaching out to points which have, heretofore, obtained their supplies from other points. The custom mill has established and adhered to during the past two years, of paying about 4 cents per bushel more for wheat than was paid elsewhere, is bearing fruit. The absolute fair dealing that the farmer always gets, is giving to the Scio Mills the reputation which is justly merited.

### Another Pioneer Passes Away

On Thursday of last week, at the home of her son-in-law, W. W. Crawford, of West of Lebanon, Mrs. S. A. Blodgett, one of the pioneers of near Lebanon, passed away. Mrs. Blodgett had been ill for a long time and the end, to her, was a most welcome release. Her husband, B. F. Blodgett preceded her to the Great Beyond several years ago. The family home lies within one mile of Lebanon and remains yet intact just as the husband and father left it. Six children, three sons and three daughters survive the deceased. The interment occurred at Lebanon on the following Saturday.

### Magnificent Apples.

E. C. Monnich, who owns the Morris orchard, is now engaged in harvesting as fine apples as can be found in a Hood River orchard. His kings, north-south spies, baldwins and bendavis, are as fine and perfect as can be found any where. Mr. Monnich thinks he will have about 10,000 bushels of first-class merchantable apples and as many more for drying purposes. His Spitzenberg trees, owing to unfavorable weather last spring, are not producing a crop this year. Mr. Monnich is satisfied that the orchard is a most profitable investment and if handled properly, is a sure money maker.

### Action for Costs.

Action before the circuit court of Linn county has been commenced by W. H. Warwick, against J. N. Morris, of Lebanon, for \$297.50. This is the cost of a suit brought by Morris against Warwick for damages for alienating the affections of Morris' wife from him; which culminated in the couple being divorced. Morris had sued for \$39,000 damages.
