OREGON FOR TAFT.

Will Carry State by Over 2,000 Votes According to Returns.

Portland, Nov. 4.—Taft wins Oregon's electoral vote by between 24,000 and 25,000, according to incomplete returns from 33 counties and complete returns from Hood River county. He carries every county by pluralities ranging from 100 in Baker to 8,900 in Multnomah. The state vote stands near 65,000 for Taft and 40,000 for Bryan. In the presidential election four years ago Oregon gave Roosevelt 42,934 plurality, the vote for Roosevelt being 60,455, and for Parker 17,521. Socialists, Prohibitionists and Independents polled yesterday perhaps 10,000 votes in the state. The whole vote was close to 15,000. The registration prior to the election was 133,178, of which 56,396 were Republican and 32,263 were Democratic.

To cast Oregon's four votes for Taft the state has chosen the Republican candidates for presidential electors—R. R. Butler, of Gilliam county; J. D. Lee, of Multnomah; A. C. Marsters, of Douglas, and Frank J. Miller, of Linn.

Pendleton, Nov. 3.—Complete returns from 28 out of 39 precincts in the county give Taft 2,216; Bryan, 1,444.

Salem, Nov. 3.—Marion county will probably give Taft a plurality of 1,400 over Bryan.

Corvallis, Nov. 3.—Taft's plurality in Benton county will be 430. Corvallis gives Taft a plurality of 290, and five precincts in the county give him a plurality of 56.

Klamath Falls, Nov. 3.—Klamath Falls gave Taft 315; Bryan 186; Debs 44; Higen 3; Chafin 5. Incomplete returns from the county give Taft 499; Bryan 332; Debs 68; Higen 9; Chafin 3.

Albany, Or., Nov. 3.—Taft has carried Linn county by about 375 plurality. Complete returns from 38 out of 31 precincts give Taft 2,048; Bryan 1,680; Chafin 136; Debs 324; Higen 10.

Hood River, Nov. 4.—Complete returns from Hood River county give Taft, Rep., 768; Bryan, Dem., 360; Chafin, Pro., 47; Debs, Soc., 55; Higen, Ind., 30.

Eugene, Nov. 3.—With 500 to 1,400 votes yet to count, Lane county gives Taft a majority of 1,174. The Taft vote stands 2,697 Bryan 1,523. Taft will have about 1,300 majority in Lane.

Hillsboro, Nov. 3.—Eleven precincts complete out of 21 in Washington county give Taft 1,429, Bryan 623.

Astoria, Nov. 3.—Complete returns from the city and four outside precincts give Taft 1,176 and Bryan 511.

Condon, Nov. 3.—Complete returns from the four largest precincts in Gilliam county give Taft 370, Bryan 188, Debs 22.

Grants Pass, Nov. 3.—Josephine county has gone Republican. Early returns show a majority for Taft of 250.

Prineville, Nov. 3.—All signs point to Taft having carried Crook county by a plurality of more than 300.

Enterprise, Nov. 3.—Enterprise, Willows and Joseph precincts, casting about one-half of the total votes of Willows county, give Taft 511; Bryan 217; Debs, 51; Chafin 8; Higen 1.

Moro, Nov. 3.—Complete unofficial returns from Sherman county with the exception of one small precinct give Taft 426; Bryan 250; Chafin 25; Debs 32.

Roseburg, Nov. 3.—Complete returns from 17 out of 31 precincts give Taft 1,346; Bryan 977.

Maarfield, Nov. 3.—Ten precincts in Coos county give Taft 1,025; Bryan 355; Debs 37.

St. Helens, Nov. 3.—Taft will carry Columbia county by 700.

Canyon City, Nov. 3.—This precinct shows impartial returns. Taft 63; Bryan 35; Chafin 1; Debs, 3; Higen 2. Taft's estimated plurality in Grant county is 350.

Oregon City, Nov. 3.—Complete returns from 26 out of 29 precincts in Clackamas county give Taft 2,095; Bryan 1,485.

Jacksonville, Nov. 3.—Seven precincts complete in Jackson county give Taft 632; Bryan 501. Taft's majority will probably reach 400.

Portland, Nov. 3.—Taft's plurality in Multnomah county will pass 8,000. Complete returns from 110 precincts of a total of 115 give Taft a lead over Bryan of 7,986. Complete returns for the county will increase his plurality to at least 8,200.

Baker City, Nov. 3.—Returns from 20 precincts in Baker county give Taft 1,406; Bryan 1,296. Baker county in 1904 gave Roosevelt 1,990; Parker 940.

Heppner, Nov. 3.—Complete reports from half of the precincts in Morrow county give Taft a majority of about two to one.

La Grande, Nov. 3.—Complete returns from 15 precincts in Union county out of 24 give Taft 1,331 and Bryan 1,063. Chafin and Higen have polled less than 100 votes together.
