HAS A WRONG IDEA.

The NEWS is in receipt of a letter from Commissioner Russell, of Sweet Home, asking if Scio has any locations to submit to the County Court as a site upon which to build the County High School. Mr. Russell states that a number of different sites have been submitted to the Court, from which to select, etc.

petition was submitted, has several provisions. But the petition only set forth one of these provisions. The County Court has no authority whatever, to buy a site nor to erect a High School building. The petition authorizing the submission of the matter to the people and which carried at the polls, simply empowers the Court to levy a High School tax. The law defines who shall constitute the County High School board, viz; the County Judge and the two Commissioners, the County Treasurer and the County School Superintendent. This board has authority to contract with any district having a High School, to teach the County High School pupils, and to pay for the same from the County High School fund. Now this law, as interpreted by Lane county, permits the H. S. board to contract with one or more districts which have High Schools, to receive the High School pupils. The petitioners contemplated that our County High School board would formulate some general rules and requirements, by which any district in the county having sufficient High School pupils, might participate or share in this County High School fund. In other words it was intended for this fund to assist any district which desires, to maintain a High School up to and including the twelfth grade. To concentrate all of the High School pupils in one school or one locality, will defeat the purpose intended. It was intended to place the High School education within the reach of all; yet allow the pupils to remain at their own homes. It was not intended to put the county to the expense of buying a site or siteignor of erecting a building or buildings.

The only expense contemplated for the county to assume, is the tax necessary to defray the tuition of the High School pupils. The responsibility of supplying building and other necessary expenses, to be supplied by the districts desiring High Schools.

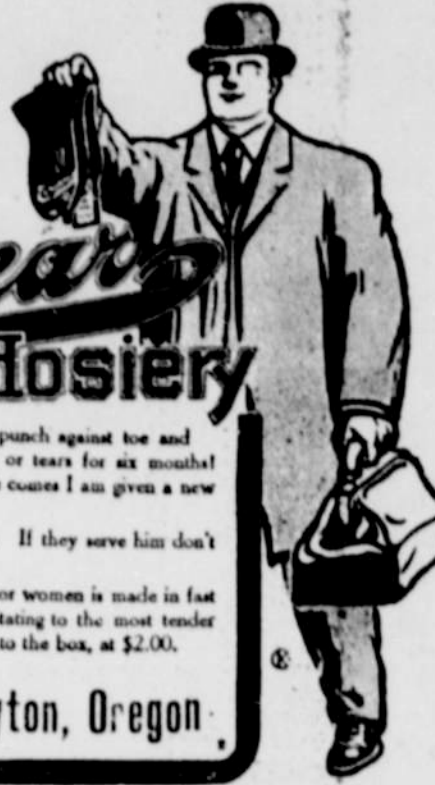
