OBITUARY

Charlotte Shelton Thomas was born in Patrick county, Virginia on March 2nd 1855 and died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Arrilla Burkhardt, 5 miles North of Lebanon, Linn county, Ore., on March 28, 1909; aged 84 years and 26 days.

She crossed the plains with her parents in 1847, the parents taking up a donation land claim situate about 6 miles east of Scio. She was married to John Thomas in 1850. The husband died on March 15, 1891 on the farm in Jordan where they had resided almost continuously since their marriage. Since the death of her husband she has lived with her children.

To them eleven children have been born, 8 boys and 3 girls, nine of whom survive her—Marion Thomas, of Albany Ore.; Arrilla Burkhardt, of Lebanon; J. K. W. N. and T. H. Thomas, of Jordan; Sarah Schneider, of Iles, Ore.; Rebecca Kinsey, of Mehama, Ore.; and L. H. Thomas, of Stayton, Ore., besides four brothers and one sister—James Shelton, of Albany; A. M. and Haman Shelton, of Jordan; Lee Shelton, Scio and Sarah Gaines, of Crabtree, Ore.

When a girl, she united with the Missionary Baptist church, of which she ever lived a faithful and consistent member. Her love, mercy, charity and Christian kindness was administered to all with whom she associated with. One note of our loving, faithful Christian mothers and pioneers has gone to her reward.

Interment occurred at the Bilyeu Den cemetery, on Monday March 29, the service being conducted by Rev. A. H. Carman, pastor of the Baptist church at Scio.

To Be Tried Next Month

It will be remembered that about one year ago, the citizens of Crabtree, Spicer and along the railway line between these points of the Woodburn-Springfield line of the Southern Pacific system, filed a complaint with the state Railroad Commission, of the service being furnished over the above named line.

The railway bridge was so injured by the floods of three years ago, that no trains have crossed the South Santiam bridge since that time. Since which time, the road has been operated by trains from Crabtree to Woodburn and from Albany via Tallman to Springfield, while the section between Tallman and Crabtree has been almost wholly neglected and for this neglect, the complaint was filed.

In response to this complaint, the Railroad Commission held investigations at Crabtree and at Lebanon. The result of which was an order for the two ends of the line to be connected and the order placed in the hands of Attorney General Crawford to be enforced. To this end, suit will be brought before Judge Galloway's court, next month at Salem to enforce the order.

It is almost a foregone conclusion that Judge Galloway will order the connection made. Just what the next step of the railway people will be is an enigma. The present location of the bridge is not a good one. Indeed, there is, so the engineers say, no good location for a bridge across the South Santiam North of the Lebanon wagon bridge, without a very heavy expense.

To rebuild at the present site would require a structure 1700 feet long and to insure the river to continue to flow under the bridge, would require the banks of the river to be riprapped for several hundred yards above. Because of the heavy expense required and the small amount of business along the abandoned line, the railway people have, heretofore, refused to rebuild the bridge. But the time is now at hand when something must be done. A change of several miles in the line may be the final result.

It will be a great relief to the people to have the connection made, as the present railway service could not be worse, especially on this end of the line.
