John Vaetecka
John Vaetecka, whose death occurred at 1 p. m., April 21, 1909, was born in Bohemia on May 17, 1847. He emigrated to the United States when he was about 18 years of age and made his home in the state of Iowa, engaging in the work of farm laborer. When 22 years of age, he was united in marriage to Miss Annie Ira and at once commenced farming on his own account, in which he has been reasonably successful. In 1895 he sold a part of his farm and came to Oregon, but remained only 18 months when he returned to Iowa. The second removal to Oregon occurred in 1899 and a farm near Scio was purchased.

To the Vaeteckas have been born eight children, four boys and four girls, all of whom are living save one daughter, who died in Iowa six years ago. Those living are married and in good circumstances financially.

He was a member of the order of Z. C. B. J. in which he carried a life insurance policy of \$1000.

Death of Lee Gunsaul
Lee Gunsaul, who is well known in this city, died at the home of his sister, Mrs. Fernande Seahale, of this side of Jefferson, on Monday morning. A COLD BLOODED SLAUGHTER
Nutting's Empire Was Nutty

Somebody has said that the Scio ball team played a game of ball over at the county seat, last Sunday. This is a mistake. They simply tried to play a game and succeeded in an admirable manner for four innings; despite the rank work of Empire Schultz. At the end of the fourth canto, when the score stood Scio 2, Albany 1, the Scio team concluded that they were playing against ten men instead of nine, the usual number of baseball contests, and they simply quit trying to play. They knew it was no use to put up good ball for it was a foregone conclusion that they were not to win, no matter how well they played. When outsiders can see that rank injustice is being dished out in gobs, it is dead sure the team which is getting the worst of it, sees it as well. Scio made errors in plenty and most of them were costly ones too; for, in the fifth, Albany made six runs, which cinched the game. The game was ragged on both sides, with Albany playing less badly than Scio. When the agony was over, the score sheet showed, Scio 5 and Albany 12. Each of the pitchers struck out four men. Albany walked 2 men, Scio none. The features of the game was a home run by Huddleston, of Scio and a high left-hand catch and a double by Albany. The attendance was about 500.

The Alco team are a gentlemanly set of fellows and treated their visitors nicely in every respect except in the selection of the umpire. A worse man for the place cannot be found in Oregon. Be it said to the credit of the Scio boys, no roar was made because of the rotten work of Empire Schultz.

The Albany Democrat says the NEWS man has another guess coming. Just so! and here it is. The Scio boys want a return game on the Scio grounds in the near future. The same team played and with a fair and competent umpire, Scio will reverse the score of last Sunday. Scio will guarantee courteous treatment, far better grounds and, best of all, a square deal on the part of the umpire. Scio is willing to play for fun, money or marbles.

The Democrat, also, grows facetious over the fact that none but home men played in the Albany team. Let this be true or not, it should be remembered that Albany boasts of 7000 people, while Scio has not more than 600 to select from. From the Gold Creek District

A large crew of men is being put on the Gold creek wagonroad, over which the 100-ton smelter, costing \$100,000, is to be transported. The bridges are all built and the road constructed as far as Cedar creek. This will be the first smelter in the state of Oregon, which speaks well for the mineral resources of this district.

Some carbonate ore, carrying high values in silver and copper, is being taken from the Black Eagle mine.

Claud A. Raines, late of the Coeur d'Alene, is employed as blacksmith at the Crown mines.

L. C. Craft, after a few days stay at Scio, is again busy chucking steel in the Crown tunnel.

The dyke, on which the Crown Co. and the Golden Arch are located, has been prospected and located for a distance of five miles.

At present there are eleven incorporated companies operating in this district, which employ from five to fifteen men each. In addition, there are several private companies doing development work.

Hundreds of pounds of supplies are being freighted in from Gates. Jim Church's eight mules are kept busy all the time hauling freight to the end of the road. Carl Braden's pack train is kept busy all the time, packing from the end of the road to the different mines.

The time has passed when mining companies will install costly plants as soon as a ledge carrying values is discovered. Development work is now done and enough ore is first placed on the dump to supply the mill for, at least, one year. By doing this, they know what kind of reduction plant is needed, for, by that time, they may know that all the ore can be worked on one plant. Experience has shown that this is the only safe plan. In these days, miners know that the free gold found at the surface, or in porphyry deposits, as in the Quartzville mine, will soon run out, or turn into quartz or sulphide ore, which the free-milling process will not work.
