The Gates Tragedy
Gates is fast becoming a typical mining center; not alone because it is the starting point to mines both east and west, but because she has or had veritable "gun" men as well.
Last week a pistol duel was fought on the main street of the town, by two men who had a difference of opinion over the proprietorship of a woman of ill repute. One of the dualists, Sullivan, is dead and the other, Herve, will probably die. Sullivan was shot in the neck, the bullet ranging downward and lived but a few hours. Herve was shot through the body but it is thought that he will not live.

Men who will quarrel and fight to the death for a woman of the character which this one is reported to be, cannot be sympathized with if they meet up with the same end they would inflict upon others. Men are commended if they defend the purity of their wives and daughters, but when they fight to the death over the possession of a woman of the class this one is reported to have been, decent people are apt to say "good enough."

From R. E. Peery, who came down from the Crown mine above Gates on Tuesday, we learn that Herve was the aggressor and was entirely to blame for the tragedy. Herve had waited in Gates for two days and stated his purpose to kill Sullivan at sight.
When Sullivan arrived in a stage loaded with passengers, he had scarcely alighted when the shooting began. Herve evidently fired the first shot, the ball taking effect in Sullivan's neck. Sullivan, though a good marksman with a revolver, fired three times wildly. His fourth shot struck Herve in the back and penetrated through his body. After Sullivan had fired his fifth and last shot, he fell on his face. Herve then jumped from the hotel platform and onto his fallen foe, cursing and striking him about the head with his revolver.

Herve was taken to Salem on Monday, under arrest for murder, and was placed in the Salem hospital. At the present writing it is thought by his physicians that he may recover.

Scio Wins From Canby

Those Canby ball players are a splendid and gentlemanly lot of fellows, but they are not quite in the class with the Scio willow welders. Last Sunday was a rather disagreeable day, yet the loyal fans of the national game in this city enjoyed the game greatly, nevertheless. Last year, when the Canby boys came up on the same errand for which they came this time, our baseball scalps, they carried away the plunder. This time, they were, evidently mistaken in their calculations. They either over-estimated their own team or underestimated that of Scio.

Sunday morning was showery and blustery, so the morning game was indefinitely postponed. The afternoon was not much better, but it was decided to play a game anyway. At 2:30 Umpire MacDonald called out "play ball" and the trouble commenced.

Canby placed the celebrated McFarland, of Texas League fame in the box. This had a tendency to rattle the Scio players somewhat, but they soon recovered their batting eyes and how they did wait the ex-leaguer. Scio had a new pitcher in the box, a young man by the name of Holmes. In the first two innings he could not control the ball and matters looked rather gloomy for the locals. In the third, however, his arm commenced working to his liking and from that on he was everything desired.

Until the seventh, the game was a very close contest, with two runs to the credit of each team. When Scio went to bat in the seventh, they at once commenced to do things. They had recovered, completely from their stage fright. They concluded that McFarland was only a fair pitcher, after all. The feature of this "fatal seventh" inning was Huddleston's batting. When the bases were all full, Huddleston went to bat, having his Albany home-run bat in his hands. He connected with the first pitched ball and how it did go. Clear over the head of the center fielder. Three men came galloping home and Huddleston reached third before the ball was back in the diamond. At this time the visitors went up in the air. When the inning closed, seven of the Scios had safely crossed the home plate. This closed the run getting for both teams. McFarland was replaced with Johnson whose team mates rallied to his support so no more of the Scio

Swatters were able to reach the home base. At the finish, the score sheet showed, Canby 2, Scio 7. Strikeouts, McFarland 6, Johnson 1; Holmes 10. Errors, Canby 10; Scio 6.

Huddleston's playing was easily the feature of the game. He played ball all the time. His deep center field drive, his pilfered base when McFarland was sympathizing with the first baseman over an injured finger and his sensational closing of the game with a successful long running catch of a foul fly, stamps him as a ball player of high merit. With the exception of the seventh, Canby played good ball, but Scio played somewhat better and instead of losing their scalps to Canby as was the evident calculation of our visitors, the home team wears some additional ornaments attached to their belts.

Next Sunday Albany will come over. If the same team comes which played Scio over in that city a short time ago, Scio will have some more ornaments with which to decorate themselves.

Two games have been arranged with Jefferson, the first at Scio on June 13 and the second at Jefferson on June 20.

J. H. W. Gaines at Home

Jorie Gaines, whose home is in Portland, came up last Sunday, accompanying his father, John W. Gaines, to the latter home up Crabtree creek. Mr. Gaines went down to Portland, some two months ago. At that time he was suffering from a complaint which required a surgical operation to eradicate. While Mr. Gaines has not fully recovered, he has so far convalesced that his physician permitted him to return to his home.

Mr. Gaines is getting to be quite an old man in years, yet his vigorous constitution enabled him to pass through an ordeal which many younger men could not have withstood.
