Albany's Big Meeting

Albany, May 17, 1909—The evangelistic meetings which began May 7 in this city, in the immense tabernacle, especially erected for the purpose, have been constantly increasing in attendance until, last evening, the seating capacity of 2500 was filled almost to the limit.

The 11 a. m. services were much larger in attendance than those of the previous Sabbath. The 3 p. m. meeting was for men only, the slogan of Evangelist Johnson being "Chickens come home to roost." There was splendid music. A choir of over 50 male voices gave a selection which was loudly applauded and which was repeated at the evening service with applause. A male double-quartet sang a most touching song and Prof. Wagner a solo with great pathos. The Sunday night meeting was, by far the most largely attended of any like meeting ever held in Albany. The music from the grand chorus choir of near 300 voices, accompanied by three pianos and orchestra and joined by hundreds of singers of the vast throng in the great auditorium below, made the grandest outburst of song ever heard in Albany or Linn county. A pleasing feature of the song service was the singing of the Junior choir, seated on the front benches of the main auditorium and made up of misses of 16 years and under, who, at times, were required to carry a chorus by themselves and who won enthusiastic applause.
