Elkhorn Etchings

The Black Eagle mine continues to show up better as the tunnel progresses. Recent tests show even the country rock near the ledge to carry working value.

Preparations are being made at the Crown mines for the sinking of a 500 foot shaft. The shaft will be 8x4 feet, double compartment, and drifting done from the 100 foot level.

M. M. Peery visited the Crown mine last week and was very much pleased with the prospects there.

Good progress is being made on the road to Black Eagle and Gold Creek, about one and one-half miles of new road is finished.

The country is now staked from Stack creek to the forks of the river five miles above.

Three new claims were located by Mr. McArthur, last week, above the Lewis and Clark mine. The ore resembles the Lewis and Clark ore.

The Silver King Co. are planning extensive development work on their property. The old shaft will be cleaned out and enlarged. Drifting will be commenced from the 200 foot level.

A force of men are at work building houses, etc. They also plan to put in an electric power plant and furnish power to the other mines in the vicinity.

Mr. Looney is sinking a double compartment shaft on his property on Elkhorn creek. This is the most promising property in the country.

A rich strike is reported to have been made four miles east of Gates. The ledge is 100 feet wide and carries good values in gold and silver.

Messers Shoemaker and Burpee have opened up four feet of high grade copper ore on the American Syndicate property. They are building more houses to accommodate a larger crew which will be put on in the near future.

W. R. Nevitt, a former high school student of Albany, has made one of the richest strikes ever made in the Elkhorn country. Mr. Nevitt's find is on Stack creek, and the outcrop was found within 20 feet of the creek house used by the road crew. Four claims have been located and over 400 foot outcrop uncovered. Mr. Nevitt is fortunate in having an abundance of timber and water power. The ore is a copper carbonate and is very much like the Black Eagle ore. Assays are expected to show values around \$170 per ton. This property will make Mr. Nevitt a millionaire in a few years.

ELKHORN MINER.

Lebanon had a pretty good sized wood fire, last Friday and Saturday. The fire caught in the large pile of wood, said to contain 17,000 cords, from the engine of the wood conveyor. When the fire was discovered, the papermill fire department was called out. This proving ineffectual, the Lebanon and later on the Albany fire departments were called upon for help and which was responded to promptly.

Even this was not enough to check the flames and an engine from Salem was called for, which reached the scene of the conflagration at about 10 p. m. The combined fire fighters with nine streams of water fought for the mastery all Friday night and all day Saturday before the flames were subdued. There was some 4000 cords of wood consumed besides the conveyor of the wood hoist, making the loss about \$20,000.
