"DUGGERS SLUGGERS" ARE CHAMPIONS

Scio's Ball Tossers Play Rings. At Will Around the Albany Players—Scio's Ball Team Was Never in Better Condition to Play Ball Than at Albany, Last Sunday

Umpire McDonough called "play ball" at 2:45 and the battle was on with the "Sluggers" at bat. Scio succeeded in getting two men on bases but the side was retired before either could cross the home plate. In her half Albany placed one man on first, but he could advance no further before the third man was out. In the second Scio began the stick work in earnest. Wesely had succeeded in getting to third with Lee on second. In making a hard run for home, he was struck on the back with the ball which bounced off into the crowd. This permitted both Wesely and Lee to score. Jones registered before the side retired, making three runs for Scio. Albany was retired in 1 2 3 order. The third gave Scio 1 and Albany another goose egg. The fourth, fifth and sixth innings proved both hitless and runless for each team. In the seventh, three of the Scio sluggers had crossed the home plate when Huddleston attempted what is called in baseball parlance a "Squeeze" play. Roberts was at bat. When But attempted to steal home, Patterson Albany's catcher stepped in front of the batter just in time to receive a crack on the head with the bat. This created quite a commotion and the Albany fans demanded that Roberts should be put out of the game. But after chewing the fat for some time, Umpire McDonough decided Huddleston and the game went on. The eighth resulted Scio 1, Albany 0. The ninth and last gave Scio 3 more tallies and Albany the usual zero.

"Dugger's Sluggers" are now champions of Linn county.
