The above was the score of last Sunday's game between Jefferson and Scio. Indeed the Scio ball tossers seem to have a hooch upon all teams they meet, this season. Out of fifteen games played, they have lost but one, and this was lost because of the partial umpiring in the first game with Albany. In the other two games, the Alcos were not in the game to any considerable extent. In the second game of the series, played at Scio, the score was Albany 3, Scio 8 and in the third at Albany the score was Albany 0, Scio 11.

There has been a jealousy between Jefferson and Scio for years and ball games between the teams had almost ceased. But a series of two games, one in each town were arranged and the game of last Sunday was the first of them. We are glad to note that a spirit of good feeling seems now to prevail. Not a jar of any description marred last Sunday's meet. The umpire, Mr. Harmon of Dallas, so far as we could judge, was absolutely fair in his decisions, giving neither team the better of his work. Life preservers were thrown them, which they clung to and kept afloat until reached by lines and pulled on board. The launch had a rough old experience before reaching shore and particularly when struck by the big wave.

Monday Commissioner Butler and his bridge gang came over from Albany to commence the erection of Scio's new steel bridge, but as only one load of lumber had been delivered, he put his force at work constructing the new Miller bridge 2 and one-half miles east of town. When this bridge is completed, the Scio structure, will be commenced. Our new bridge is to have solid cement piers and as the structural work is to be of steel, the bridge will be good for the next 100 years. The structure is to be 24 feet wide with a 4 foot walk on either side and will be an improvement which Scio may be proud of. Scio is thus the third town in the county to have a steel bridge.
