The Facts in the Case

Sometime during the month of April, Dr. Sanderson, our dentist, extracted a number of teeth for J. D. Griffin. When the operation was over, Griffin asked for whiskey and the dentist wrote a prescription for it and it was filled at Peery's drug store. The bottle was uncorked in Jas. A. Bilyeu's office and was sampled by two or three persons present. This was reported to the prosecuting attorney who informed the grand jury of the matter and the arrest was ordered.
Mr. Peery does not deny the fact as above related, but supposed that a dentist had authority to write prescriptions under the above conditions. Whether the dentist has this right, is a question of law and which will be decided by the court when the case is brought before him. Mr. Peery did not think he was violating the law when he filled this particular prescription, nor did he intend to do so. Lawyers differ as to what is the intent of the law in cases of this character. What view the court will take of the matter remains yet to be seen.
