Fatal Accident

Joseph Boyanovsky Jr., son of Joseph Boyanovsky, Sr., of near Beaver creek, on the Scio-Lebanon wagon road, was almost instantly killed, at his father's home, early Tuesday morning. Just how the accident occurred is somewhat conjectural, as nearly as the News could learn, the facts are as follows:

Mr. Boyanovsky was preparing to haul hay and little 7-year old Joe and his brother were hooking up the team for this purpose, the father having gone to the house for some reason. When the team had been hooked to the wagon and the boys were on the rack, it was discovered that some of the line checks had not been snapped. Joe got down from the wagon to snap the checks. While he was in front of the team, the horses started and passed over the unfortunate boy. It is thought that, as the wagon passed over him, he was caught in one of the wheels and carried around with it. Blood was found on both the wagon hammer and the brake block, and as the skull was crushed and an ugly looking wound in the forehead, it is thought that either the hammer or brakeblock caused the wound and the death a few minutes later.

The month of July, every two years, seemed to have been particularly unfortunate to little Joe. Four years ago he fell from a horse and a broken leg resulted; two years ago he fell from a tree breaking one of his arms, and the present fatal accident has closed the chapter. Mr. Boyanovsky, the father, is one of our progressive and prosperous Bohemian fellow citizens and has the sympathy of all in the loss of his son. The funeral occurred at Franklin Butte cemetery on Wednesday.

Steel to Replace Wooden Bridges

An Albany dispatch to the Oregonian reads as follows:

The county court has decided to build steel bridges in the future and from this time on all wooden bridges will be replaced by the more substantial ones of steel. The first steel bridge ever erected by Linn county are in process of erection at Brownsville and Scio. The former will span the Calapoia river and connect North and South Brownsville, while the latter will cross Thomas creek, which divides Scio into two parts. The fill, which replaces the approaches of the old bridge, has been completed at Brownsville and the piers are being constructed, while at Scio the work is just commencing. Both of these cities have an unusually large amount of traffic due to the fact that they are built on both sides of the streams.

It is believed that the construction of steel bridges will prove economical in the long run where a very long bridge is required and where the traffic across it is very great. Linn County has a splendid system of wooden bridges, however, and it is the purpose of the court to continue their erection except in replacing the more important bridges of the county as they become unsafe. Heretofore the only steel bridge owned by Linn county is that crossing the Willamette river at this city and it was built by the city of Albany and later given to the county.
