Mexican Mine Limited

The Gazette, of Guanajuato, Mexico, has the following to say with reference to President J. L. Hill's visit to that city and the mines, of which he is the presiding officer. It is sufficient to say that Dr. Hill is highly elated over the prospects of the future development of the mine. The fact that all sales of the stock have been withdrawn from the market and the company have sufficient money with which to develop the mine, install mills, etc., is most encouraging. It is expected that the mine will be on a dividend paying basis in a few months. Dr. Hill expects to return to the mine this fall, to remain several months.

"Much activity is now going on at the above mine and work is being pushed as fast as possible. Dr. J. L. Hill, of Albany, Oregon, who is the president of the company, was here last week to arrange some important work with the resident manager, Charles Cummings, and left a few days ago. The mines owned by this company comprise the La Bonita and Nueva Idra, both situated in the El Cubo district and considered very valuable. The present work is on the new tunnel and the same is now in about 50 feet. The old tunnel has been temporarily abandoned on account of insufficient values and the new tunnel is being so constructed that it drains the water out of the mine as fast as the same is made which is a great saving of expense, eliminating all pumping. The force consists of a day and night shift at present."

Prospects Are Good For New Mining Town

Black Eagle, Oregon's newest town, is located at the junction of Horn Creek with the Little North Fork of the North Santiam River, 14 miles north-east of Gates, on the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad and six miles from Elk-horn, terminus of the old wagon road from Gates. It stands in the heart of the Gold Creek mining district, and will be the trading point for that rapidly developing district.

The new town is reached by a wagon road from Gates, the new Black Eagle road being completed to a point within half a mile of the town site. This road will run down the main street of the town. A preliminary survey of an electric line from Salem to Mehama and thence up the Little North Fork of the Santiam has been made and this will pass through the new town. Marion county is also building a new wagon road from Mehama into the Gold Creek district, and though it is eight miles farther to the mines from Mehama than Gates, a haul over a high mountain is avoided and the new wagon road will increase the facilities of transportation into the district.

The Gold Creek district continues to develop rapidly and large crews are at work there. A big hotel has been needed badly there for some time, and it is believed one will soon be built at Black Eagle. With the completion of the smelter the Wilson-Gadsden Company of Portland, will soon install in the Gold Creek district, Black Eagle will probably become an active mining town.—Stayton Mail.

Will Arrive September 30

Electric Line to Munkers

The one crying need of Scio is a railroad. Given immediate railway connection and Scio would rival any other town in the valley for rapid growth. We have as fine a section of the country as the sun shines on and an electric line would pay from the start.

It is estimated that the proposed line would not cost to exceed \$15,000 to \$20,000 and the electric plant now in stalled for lighting purposes, would supply sufficient power.

The effect of such a line would be to double the value of every foot of land in Scio and vicinity. So if property owners will contribute one-third of what the increase of their property would be, the line could be built easily.

God helps those who help themselves. It is said. We have waited long enough for the S. P. to build to town and the prospects now is that we can expect nothing from that source. The time has arrived for us to act. It is, also, safe to say, if Scio undertakes to build an electric railway connection to Munkers, it will be done and will be successful. We need such a line every day in the year and while there is now business sufficient to pay expenses, the increase of business would soon be paying a profit. So let us move.

Oregon has vast natural resources which has been bottled up and are being bottled up by speculators. Our water power alone is worth hundreds of millions of dollars, and has been largely grabbed by agents of foreign corporations. All honor of the men who are endeavoring to conserve the natural wealth remaining for the use of the people of Oregon. However, we may be compelled to go further and reach a hand out for the restoration to the people of the gifts of the common Father. President Roosevelt pointed out how to restore the water power to the public domain, when he advocated levying a tax upon it whether used or unused. No trust could pay even 50 cents a horse-power per month, as suggested by Roosevelt, and retain idle ten times what they made use of in productive energy.—Labor Press, Portland.
