School to Open

One week from next Monday, the
Scio schools will open under more favor-
able auspices than heretofore. As Scio
is the starter for the adoption of the
high school law for Linn county, it is

be enlarged to include the high school
grades the 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th.
This has been done and preparations
have been made to this end by adding
one more teacher, and the other neces-
sary preparations. The teaching force
for the present school year is as
follows:

Principal and teacher of high school
grades, Prof. A. Roy Mize.

Principal of grammar school, A. P.
Hirons.

Teacher of intermediate department,
Mrs. E. J. Kimball.

Teacher of the primary department,
Miss Ruth Evans.

All of these teachers have been suc-
cessful heretofore, and give promise of
good work during the coming year. It
is expected that the attendance will
show a large increase over last year,
for it is expected that quite a number
of tenth grade pupils from adjoining
districts will attend.

Runaway Accident

name, sends us the following incident.
It is against the rule of this office to
publish items which are unsigned by
the sender; yet, in this case, there

give the item publicity:

September 10, 1909. To the Santiam
News—The Louisa, a small launch
which runs between Salem and In-
dependence, had a very narrow escape on
Friday, the 17th inst. in coming over
some rapids about three miles below
Independence. The steering gear gave
way, which left the small craft to the
mercy of the waters. The boat was
soon carried against a log, broadside,
which caused it to dip and fill with
water. The flood of water caused the
engine to stop and the boat was ob-

thence to Salem. The passengers re-
