Death of Dr. Lamberson

Dr. J. A. Lamberson died at his home in Lebanon, Wednesday morning at 8:40 o'clock. The immediate cause was a second stroke of paralysis. During his long invalidism he, seemingly, retained the full use of his mind and he continued to conduct a limited office practice.

Mr. Bryan in Portland

Mr. Bryan arrived in Portland last Sunday evening on the North Bank road from Spokane. He did not travel over either a special train nor special car. He and Mrs. Bryan travel as simple American citizens, without being attended by secret service men or gold laced aids. Fully two thousand people were at the Hoyt street depot to welcome the distinguished commoner. All or nearly all of whom greeted him with a cordial hand shake.

What is there about William J. Bryan which causes the people to even go miles to greet him? Though thrice defeated for the office of president and the subsidized corporation newspapers continually hounding him, he bolia the confidence and love of the people. The things for which he stands, is the only answer. Mr. Bryan will, probably, never be president, but he advocates the cause of the common people in such a way and with such unprecedented oratorical ability, that he has placed himself first in the hearts of his countrymen. Subsidized news papers and political bosses may and probably will continue to abuse and ridicule him; but they cannot convince the people that he is not their friend and is truly advocating their interests. They love him for the enemies he has made.

Double Runaway

Two teams came racing down Main street last Friday afternoon. One was attached to a buggy and the other, carrying the neck yoke with dropped traces. Crossing the bridge under full speed, the buggy came in the lead, both teams turned east on Mill street. The loose team crossed the mill race and passed on to the gravel pits, where it was stopped. One of this team limped slightly after the run and one of the traces had been broken. The cause of the run was the blowing off of steam by H. S. Johnson's wood saw engine. Young Mr. Garland was seated in the buggy, but his team started and turned so quickly that he was tipped out. The loose team belonged to Wm. Hassler, and was standing at the wagon tongue, while Hassler had stepped into J. R. Gills blacksmith shop on some matter of business.

This runaway demonstrates the utility of sidewalks to the bridge. Had women or children been on the driveway of the bridge, at this time, a more serious ending of the fracas might have resulted.

High School Board Meets

The present high schools are those of Albany, Lebanon, Harrisburg, Halsey, Shedd, Tangent, Oakville, Scio, North and South Brownsville, Mill City, Sodaville and Plainview, and it is proposed to build two room schools, may come in.

Each school will receive \$40 for each scholar, on the average attendance for eight months, up to 20, then \$30 up to 40, afterwards \$12.50.

The course of study required will be strictly followed. Superintendent Jackson will start Monday looking over the field, first going to Mill City.
