**Annual Meeting**  
The Scio Condensed Milk Co. held its first annual meeting Wednesday afternoon. Just one year ago the company was organized. During last winter the plant was installed and about April 1 commenced the manufacture of the now celebrated "Country Club" brand of condensed milk. Since the first delivery of the manufactured product, the brand has grown in favor wherever introduced.

The management of the business during the past six months, has been along conservative lines, not attempting to go too fast, using the utmost care in the manufacture until now the demand has increased to a degree that getting the raw milk is the only problem.

The entire board of officers were re-elected, which should be sufficient evidence that their management has been satisfactory.

It is hoped that the milk supply from now on will be sufficient to keep the condensery moving at a profitable pace.

**New Circuit Court Case**  
Complaint was filed this morning in the case of Wm. Downing vs. J. W. Richardson. Wm. Downing as plaintiff states that up to and on the 14th of October, 1909 he was the owner of 135 head of stock goats branded with green paint on the back. On the 14th the defendant unlawfully took possession of the goats and drove them into his barns and lots and has since refused to deliver them to the plaintiff. Downing states that he values them at \$400 and prays the court for judgment against Richardson for the goats or the \$400 and \$50 damages. The parties live near Crabtree. J. K. Weatherford is the attorney for the plaintiff.—Albany Herald.

**Encouraging Railroad News**  
A Salem special dispatch to Tuesday's Morning Oregonian states that active construction of the Welch electric line southward from that city, will begin within ninety days. The line of the road will parallel the Southern Pacific on the east passing the Reform school, Turner, Marion and probably cross the North Santiam at the eastern end of the F. Denny farm. The line will pass through Albany, Peoria, Junction and on to Eugene.

From the Denny crossing the distance to Scio is not over five miles, with no streams or other obstructions to intervene. With the large amount of traffic originating in Scio and vicinity, the large timber belt, etc., there is hardly a doubt but what an extension into Scio will become a part of the system.

Last week the editor of the NEWS made a special trip to Portland, to interview Mr. Welsh. While he was not prepared, at that time, to make definite promises, he did promise to send a representative to Scio, to look over the situation.

Within the next few weeks, the railroad situation will probably develop in a way which will be very satisfactory to this section of the county.

**W. J. Henderson's Stamp Mill**  
The Democrat has received a prospectus of the California Rapid Stamp Quartz Mill, issued by the Oakland Stamp-Mill Co., which is of particular interest to Albany people on account of the principal men in the company.
