The Booster Meeting.

Wednesday afternoon, quite a number of our citizens, including several from the country met, at the Wesely-Cain hall to listen to Oregon's chief booster, the only Tom Richardson, manager of the Portland Commercial club. Mr. Richardson arrived in this city Tuesday evening and Mr. Wallace R. Struble manager of the Albany Commercial club came over on the following morning.

With two such eminent Oregon boosters, it was a sure thing that, those of our citizens who came in contact with them, would imbibe some of the booster spirit. So when the hour of meeting came all were ready to listen to how results had been achieved through judicious and sensible advertising of Oregon's resources.

Mr. E. C. Peery, president of the Scio Commercial club assumed charge of the meeting and after a few preparatory remarks, introduced Mr. Struble, who, in a twenty minutes talk told of what Albany was doing in the way of civic improvement and what she was doing to advertise the resources of Linn County and central Willamette valley. He, also, stated that Albany was willing to assist every other town in Linn county to get its full share of the prosperity which was coming and would come to Oregon, in the way of home-building and industrious citizens.

After a selection of music by the orchestra, Oregon's chief booster, Tom Richardson was introduced. While Mr. Richardson draws his salary from the Portland Commercial club his share of influence and usefulness extends all over the state.

He stated that because of the campaign of advertising conducted chiefly by the Portland Commercial club, Oregon had received a larger emigration during the past year, than any other Pacific coast station; that more tickets of A. Y. P. fair visitors were used in Portland than in Seattle, and that Oregon was the central attraction to the Pacific coast home seeker.

After stating the large amount of money which had been expended to advertise the resources of Oregon by her various cities, he cited that the increase of value of a corner lot on 6th and Washington, street, Portland, during the same period, would pay the entire bill.

Peery \$5 per month etc.—A. G. Trill, Hiram Parker, Chas. Wesely \$2 per month each, and the Linnhaven Orchard Co., \$5 per month.

It is desired to have this monthly subscription increased to \$50 per month, the whole to be expended in advertising the resources of Scio and eastern Linn county.

Messrs Richardson and Struble drove over to Jefferson immediately after the close of the meeting.

A good method by which the country press can materially assist in defeating the efforts of people or newspapers who are advocating the advisory mass convention plan is, to announce that they will only support candidates for the legislature who subscribe to Statement No 1 and for other offices, candidates who refuse to participate in or accept nomination at the hands of the mass convention. Further, if the friends of our Direct Primary law will publicly announce that they will not support at the polls, a candidate who accepts a nomination at the hands of the mass convention, such candidates will be conspicuous because of their absence from the ticket.

Scio was visited by the usual Halloween pranks, last Sunday night. As the jokes were limited to moving about of various articles to wrong places, barricading sidewalks, writing with soap on windows, the gang is supposed to have been young boys, who should have been at home in bed. Such pranks are a nuisance and should be abolished. It is not a mark of smartness on the part of the participators, but is a source of aggravation to property owners. Summary punishment will, some day, be necessary to curb the mischief makers.
