Railroad Survey Commenced

Wednesday afternoon a surveyor with the necessary force of men commenced locating the Scio railroad. The initial terminal will be at the Scio floating mills, where the temporary depot will be located, and runs thence north on Portland avenue, following the old grade, until it reaches the north side of W. A. Eving's residence. From thence the line will cross the corner of the property, where R. W. Gill now resides, thence across the public road diagonally, cutting off the northeast corner of T. A. Richardson's property; thence along the south side of the public road to Munkers; thence across the farms to a point on the North Santiam, where the electric line is supposed to cross.

It is the purpose to survey the line, obtain the right of way and then incorporate the company, after which arrangements to build the line will be made. The cost when completed and equipped, will be about \$40,000 and the traffic, it is thought, will pay operating expenses and interest upon the cost of the road.

Eventually, it is expected, that the Scio road will become a part of the electric system which is sure to cover the valley with a net work of lines. Our object now is to have railway connection with West Scio and Munkers.
