LINN APPROPRIATES \$6000 FOR ARMORY

A Portland dispatch says:—Complying with the conditions accompanying a \$12,000 donation made by the state of Oregon for a \$24,000 armory to be erected at Albany this spring, the Linn county court on Saturday appropriated \$6000 for the building. A like amount will be contributed by the city of Albany. The city council is devising ways and means for raising the money. The erection of the armory is assured. The Albany papers are absolutely silent about the matter. If true, the NEWS will have something to say on the subject later on.

The Scio-Munkers Railroad

While matters may have seemed quiet on the Scio-Munkers railway project, the enterprise is not dead by any means. It should be remembered that the people promoting this enterprise are not professional railway promoters, but men of our own town and who have their own private business to attend to; yet they have not given up this very meritorious enterprise to the people of the forks of the Santiam, by any means.

Last week Dr. A. G. Prill and Mr. E. C. Peery made application to the county court for a franchise and certain privileges a out the county road. Concerning this matter, the Albany Democrat says:

Dr. Prill and E. C. Peery were before the county court last night asking a franchise for crossing the county road by the electric line to run from Scio to munkers now being projected, an enterprise that deserves promotion.

Scio is entitled to a railroad connection, and the people of Linn county should unite in aiding to secure it. There should be an extension of the road from the C. & E. into the city, with a gasoline motor running to Albany for connection with the outside world. With the county fair there the city needs a train service right into the city and should be given it.

City Council

City council met in regular session, Thursday, March 3, Mayor Myer presiding; Councilmen J. A. Bilyeu, Morrison, Arnold, Perry Bilyeu, Cain and Alcalaen being present.

Committee reports on the recorder and treasurer of 1909, read and placed on file.

Bills allowed—E. C. Peery, 25c; Chas. Wesely, \$2.24; Ralston Supply Co. \$4.27; Fred B. West, \$67.40; O. P. Hoff, Bureau of Labor, \$7.00; P. H. MacDonald, retiring city recorder, \$179.00. Petition for electric light at corner of 1st and Bilyeu streets, referred to F. and L. committee. Application of Car Cyrus for the position of city electrician, read and placed on file. The L. and W. committee stated that the position of city electrician would not be vacant before May 1.

The L. and W. committee was instructed to make rates with the people who cut out their lights during the summer time.

City recorder reported that a contract had been entered into with the Ralston Supply Co., to furnish electric lamps.

Recorder instructed to notify Pacific States, Telephone Co., that all dead electric poles must be removed within thirty days.

Marshal instructed to collect delinquent dog tax. Adjourned.
