To Change C. & E. Tract

A company of railroad surveyors arrived in Philomath today and will begin west of town near the tannery and work up Woods Creek and around Mary's Peak and down Big Elk to Elk City. Their object is to find if possible a more direct route for the C. & E. railroad through this very rough and broken strip of country. It is claimed that by the change a distance of 12 miles will be saved. Severely Injured

Nearly A Fire

Monday afternoon, one of Eli Luckenbach's visitors noticed sparks falling from the stove flue, in his shoe shop. Examination showed a nice little blaze in the roof. By quick work and the application of a few buckets of water, the incipient blaze was subdued. A hole in the roof large enough for a man to crawl through, was the extent of the damage. Had the blaze not been discovered for a few minutes later, a disastrous fire might have resulted, for the range of four or five wooden buildings, in one of which the shop is located, are all old and dry and would have made a hot fire.

But Scio is much better situated to fight fire now, than when we had the big fire three years ago. Large water mains and a more powerful pump, makes the town much safer from damage from fire.

The Name America

The discussion over the origin of the name America breaks out from time to time, and two interesting letters upon the subject have appeared in The World's columns. The real reason why it was called America and not Columbia, after its discoverer, was due to peculiar circumstances and not to any attempt to defraud Columbus of the honor.

The ancients believed in a mysterious "Fourth Continent," which has been based on some legendary knowledge in the East of either America or Australia. Old maps before the time of Columbus have Africa ending at or near the equator. Directly south of it but separated by a wide sea lay what is called "The Fourth Continent," which no European had ever visited.

As every schoolboy knows, it was long believed that Columbus had merely reached the east coast of Asia by a shorter route, but Vesputi, sailing much further south than Europeans had been before, touched the coast of Brazil.

South America extends a far greater distance to the east than North America, a fact which was believed in Europe that Vesputi had discovered the mysterious "Fourth Continent," something distinct from the discovery of Columbus. His name was accordingly given to it in entire innocence by the geographer Waldseemüller. By the time it was ascertained that Columbus had reached not East Asia but a new continent, the southern part of which Vesputi had touched upon some years later, the name spread to the whole and was a common use. That is why we are Americans and not Columbians.—N. Y. World

Salem Horse Show Notes

The Annual Horse Show at Salem has come to be one of the most important events of the year in the Willamette Valley, and this year it is to be a two days event, Friday and Saturday, April 8 and 9.

The feature of the second day will be the live stock sale, which will take place in the afternoon. It is expected that buyers and sellers will both assemble from all parts of the valley, and as the entries of stock for sale are to be printed in catalogue form and mailed broadcast there should be no difficulty in finding buyers for all the available horses in the country.

Last year the Horse Show was equal to the horse show at the Oregon State Fair in many particulars, and 40,000 people were in the city to witness the event. This year it is expected that at least 50,000 will be guests of the capital city during the two days of the show, and low rates for round trips have been granted on all railroads.

The Horse Show Association, of which C. L. Dick is president and R. C. Paulsen secretary, has effected a permanent organization so that this event will be handled in a business like manner from year to year. It is planned to erect bleachers and grandstand along the streets, which will be carefully taken down and stored for another season; and a movement is already on foot to erect a \$25,000 auditorium in which this event may be held in the future.

A Successful Meeting

Three candidates were given the first and second degrees. Arrangements were entered into with the directors of the Linn County Fair Association to have a "Grange Day" and to give a premium of \$25 for the best grange exhibit.

Roy Shelton was elected and installed as secretary of the grange.

Geo. L. Southerland presented some Good Roads resolutions, embodying the idea that road districts should be limited to the size of the school districts and the supervisors elected, and the taxes of each district expended therein. The resolutions were referred to a committee of three, to report at the next meeting.

An elegant lunch was served at noon. Lecturers hour was devoted to the following program: Piano solo, Miss Agnes Cain, with encore; Chinook song, C. H. Walker, encore, Chinook Temperance song; Declaration, Roy Shelton, applauded; Solo, R. M. Cain, accompanied on guitar by Mrs. R. M. Cain, encore; Violin solo, Master Walter Balchweid, encore; Solo, Miss Jennie White, accompanied on the piano by Miss Ma White, encore.
