BOQUETS FOR SCIO

Scio's Progressiveness is Commended by the Albany Herald—
Albany Advised to Learn From Scio

The Albany Herald, under the caption of "Good Roads Are Being Agitated—Noticeable Activity All over Linn County," has the following commendatory paragraph relative to Scio:

Scio, while handicapped for some years past, through lack of direct railway communication has, nevertheless, promoted a number of enterprises of substantial character, at the head of which, without question, stands the Scio condenser.

The products of this enterprise find ready sale; in fact, the report comes direct that the capacity of the plant is overtaxed to meet the demands. A municipal light and water plant, which has given satisfactory service since its installation, is one of the features of Scio, to which its citizens point with pride.

Albany at this point, might well afford to sit at Scio's feet and learn a lesson.

The Annual Scio Fair has, through the persistent efforts of Scio citizens, developed into an event of great importance to Linn County. The exhibits of products and stock last year would have been a credit to any of the larger agricultural fairs of the Northwest, while the opportunities for social intercourse afforded by this annual gathering are not, by any means, the least important feature thereof.

Scio, like Lebanon and Brownsville, lies at the foot of a wonderfully rich productive region stretching eastward. The products of the Crabtree and Thomas Forks have been famous for years for their excellence.

A practical movement for the building of a line of electric railway to connect Scio with Mukers, the nearest station on the C. & E. R. R., is under way, and the prospects are that visitors to the next annual fair will have the privilege of riding over this line.
