### Call For Freight Rate Convention

To the commercial bodies of the Willamette valley:

The undersigned joint committee of the Albany Commercial Club and the Albany Merchants' Association, on behalf of the citizens of Albany, herewith respectfully invite your honorable body, in as large numbers as practicable, to attend an Open River and Freight Rate Convention, to be held in the Albany Commercial Club rooms at the city of Albany, Oregon, on the 14th day of April, 1910, at 2:30 p. m.

The subjects to be considered and acted on at this convention are the following:

1. Co-operation of the commercial bodies and citizens generally of the Willamette Valley in urging Congress to pass the appropriation for the purchase of the Willamette locks.

2. The immediate improvement of the Willamette river from the mouth of the Clackamas to a point as far south as practicable for the operation of steamboats.

3. The advisability of building and operating an independent line of steamboats between Portland and Willamette river points.

Prompt action by your body is respectfully urged. Please address your replies, together with statement of the number of your citizens who will probably attend this convention, to Secretary Albany Commercial Club, Albany, Oregon.

### Death Claims Civil War Veteran
