FOR FIFTY YEARS AN ODD FELLOW

L. W. Pomeroy Presented With Hand-
some Veterans Jewel Upon Reach-
ing 50th Anniversary of His
Membership of the Order

Last Saturday evening was a red let-
ter occasion for Dierdorff Lodge No. 54,
I. O. O. F. of this city. The evening
was devoted to the commemoration of
the 50th anniversary of L. W. Pomeroy's
membership of the order. And right
royally did the members of Dierdorff
entertain their hall full of guests.
Fifty years ago L. W. Pomeroy was
initiated into the mysteries of Oddfel-
lowship by Chemeketa Lodge of Salem.
He retained his membership with the
Salem lodge for fifteen years. He then
severed his membership with Chemeketa
and helped to organize Dierdorff lodge
No. 54, of this city.

It was but natural that Mr. Pomeroy
should wish some of the members of
his parent lodge to be present upon an
occasion that is seldom vouchsafed to a
member of that or any other order. In
accord with this wish a special invita-
tion was extended to Chemeketa, and
Judge Geo. H. Burnett and Al. John-
son came to represent the parent
lodge. Jefferson lodge was represented
by Uncle Frank Devaney. Lee Bilyeu
of Lebanon, O. E. Pomeroy, of Lacombe,
Thomas Small, temporarily of Detroit,
but members of Dierdorff, were present.

Dr. A. G. Prill as presiding officer,
delivered the following short address:

"The occasion for the gathering here
this evening of Odd Fellows, Rebekas
and invited friends, is one of special
moment to Dierdorff Lodge, I. O. O. F.
An event in the history of this lodge
which has never occurred before and
perhaps may never occur again, is the
object of this gathering. I allude to
the particular time of a man's life when
he can say, 'I have been a contributing
Odd Fellow for fifty years and over.'
To reach this point if one becomes a
member at the age of 21, he would be
71 years of age, at the time, he had
accomplished the journey. It falls to
the lot of but few to even reach this
age, and but very few attain the honor
to which I allude. We have among us
one to whom this honor is due, and for
this reason we are gathered here to-
night. In behalf of the officers and
members of this lodge, I extend to you
a cordial welcome. It is but proper at
this time, that your minds should be re-
freshed as to what Odd Fellowship is,
its aims and objects and what it has
accomplished, and I have the pleasure
and honor to leave this part of the
program to one most eminently fitted
for the task, and it is with pleasure
that I introduce to you, Hon. Geo. H.
Burnett, of Salem, Oregon, who will
address you."

Judge Burnett made a short address,
pertinent to the occasion, in which he
stated that Brother Lyman W. Pomeroy
had been a member of Chemeketa lodge
for 15 years and that that lodge felt a
sort of proprietorship in him and that,
in consequence, Chemeketa felt more
than ordinary interest in the present
event. He said that few men were
entitled to receive the veterans jewel
for fifty years of faithful and contin-
uous service, and that he felt it an honor
to pin the jewel on the breast of Broth-
er Pomeroy. After doing so, the judge
gave way and Mr. Pomeroy talked for
a few minutes, in which he thanked
the members of Dierdorff for the honor
it was conferring upon him. One could
see that Mr. Pomeroy felt, deeply, the
honor and respect his lodge was paying
him and expressed his appreciation in
language as strong as he could com-
mand.

After Mr. Pomeroy had concluded
his remarks, Judge Burnett was again
introduced and spoke for about one-half
hour about the objects and aims of Odd
Fellowship. He said while Odd Fellow-
ship did not have a creed nor religious
ceremonials, it did aim to make a man

honorable and upright in his dealings
a strong man, charitable and helpful to
the needy and a peaceful and law-abid-
ing citizen.

The News would have been glad to
publish the address in full, but the
editor, not being a short hand reporter,
our readers will have to be content with
this brief synopsis.

Following the address came the
banquet, and a more elegant display of
tables one will seldom see. The
tables had been arranged in the ante
room and the emblematic three links
was seen in the arrangement of biscuits,
oranges and as a decoration upon pies
and cakes. Nevertheless, all present
seemed to have enormous appetites
there was an abundance for a crowd
twice as large.

The banquet concluded, the rest of
the evening was devoted to social enjoy-
ment.

The members of Dierdorff lodge and
the companion lodge of Rebekas,
certainly acquitted themselves with
honor in this social function. Members
and visitors seemed to enjoy themselves
greatly, every minute of the evening.
And the address and social enjoyment
of the occasion surely inspired a desire
on the part of all visitors, not members,
to join the order. It will be no surprise
if a class of a dozen or more new
members is secured in the immediate
future.

JUDGE GEO. H. WIL- LIAMS PASSES AWAY

Dies Suddenly At His Home In
Portland—Nestor of the
Oregon Bar

Judge George H. Williams, Oregon's
most eminent citizen, and one of the
very few public men of civil war days,
is no more. His death occurred sudden-
ly and peacefully at his home on last
Monday, due to the infirmities of old
age.

Only a week ago he was a guest and
the chief speaker at a banquet at the
Portland hostelry, given by his friends
in commemoration of his 87th birthday.
Judge Williams has never made a more
touching and eloquent in its simplicity,
address than this the last of his public
utterances.

Judge Williams came to Oregon in
1853, as chief Justice of the territory,
appointed by President Pierce. He re-
fused reappointment by Pres. Buchanan.
He had much to do with the organiza-
tion of Oregon, the making of her con-
stitution, etc. In 1864 he was elected
United States senator by the Oregon
legislature, and served in that office
during the turbulent days following the
close of the war.

In 1871 he was appointed to be a
member of the joint high commission to
form a treaty in settlement of the
Alabama claims and was one of the
most influential members of the com-
mission. In 1872 he became a member
of President Grant's cabinet, as At-
torney General. His service in this office
concluded his connection in an official
capacity, with the Federal government.

Returning to his Portland home he
resumed practice as a lawyer, which
he continued to do, except it was inter-
rupted by a term as mayor of his home
city.

Judge Williams was Oregon's most
illustrious citizen. As an orator he had
no peer in the state. As a citizen he
was just and upright and a worthy
model for any one to emulate.
