ALBANY IS TO BE HOST

Large Delegations Expected From All Towns in Willamette Valley
—Regular Organization Will Be Effected

Albany, Ore., April 11.—(Special to Oregonian.) Plans are now practically complete for the program of the Open River and Freight Rate Convention to be held here Thursday afternoon and evening.

P. D. Gilbert, president of the Albany Business Men's Association, will call the convention to order at 2:30 in the Alco Club gymnasium and will introduce Dr. W. H. Davis, president of the Albany Commercial Club, who will make the introductory address, setting forth the purpose of the convention and welcoming the visiting delegates. Dr. Davis will preside at the afternoon session and Wallace R. Struble, manager of the Albany Commercial Club, will act as secretary of the afternoon session.

The afternoon session will be devoted to addresses only, and will be participated in by all visitors. At the evening session the delegates appointed by the various Commercial Clubs will organize the convention, elect officers and transact the business of the meeting. There will be no program for the evening session and it will be left entirely in the hands of the delegates from the Commercial Clubs of the Willamette Valley.

Following Dr. Davis' introductory address at the afternoon session, Judge W. S. McFadden, of Corvallis, will speak on "Free Locks at Oregon City." A speaker to be selected by the Eugene delegation will talk on "An Open River from the Mouth of the Clackamas South," and a Salem speaker, to be chosen by the delegation from the Capital City, will speak on the subject, "Restoration of the Old Freight Rate on Eastern Shipments." Attorney H. M. Sawyer, of Portland, will deliver the last address of the afternoon. All of these addresses are to be twenty-minute talks, and following each there will be a five-minute talk on each subject by one member of each delegation. Each delegation will choose its own speakers.

That the convention will be a big gathering is assured. The local committees are receiving reports daily from various clubs that big delegations will come. Salem, Eugene, Cottage Grove, Corvallis and Lebanon will all send monster delegations and every city in the Willamette valley will be fully represented.

The Alco Club will be thrown open to the visiting delegates for the day and they will be received in the club rooms there and at the rooms of the Albany Commercial Club. Automobiles will meet all trains and convey the visiting delegates to the club rooms. A committee consisting of F. J. Fletcher, Wm. Fortmiller, and W. H. Marvin, has been named to prepare the Alco Club gymnasium for the session, and space will be reserved for each delegation. Placards are being prepared for each city so that delegates can find their reservations as soon as they enter the hall.

Council Proceedings

Council met in regular session on Thursday evening, April 7. Mayor Myer presiding and Councilmen J. A. Bilyeu, Arnold, Perry Bilyeu, Cain and Morrison being present.

Fire, Light and Water Committee reported that it had ruled that all persons discontinuing use of electric lights for part of the year, would be required to pay \$3 to have them switched on again. The council ratified the ruling.

The matter of a street light at the intersection of 3rd and Bilyeu streets was postponed, until later in the season. Bills allowed: General Electric Co., \$10.19; Valvatore Oil Co., \$4.50; Scio Milling Co., \$45; Ralston Electric Supply Co., \$44.55; Santiam News, 50c; J. N. Weddle, \$34.70; Independent Telephone Co., \$1.75; Fred B. West, \$69.70. Fire, Light and Water Committee was ordered to see that water pipe was properly protected from the sun and weather.

Recorder ordered to advertise in the SANTIAM NEWS, 4 issues, for electrician from June 1, 1910 to February 1, 1911, bids to be accepted or rejected at the regular May meeting of the council.

Improvement Ordered

Last Tuesday evening, Leonidas Lodge No. 36, K. of P. instructed the trustees of the lodge, as a building committee, to proceed at once to repair and fit up the K. of P. building in a condition so that the upper story can be used as a lodge room. The improvement required, is the raising of the roof four feet, the addition of 14 feet on the east end, papering the lodge rooms and painting the entire building. The cost will be about \$500.
