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MAN OWES HIS LIFE TO A DOG

A Pioneer is Knocked Down By a
Bull; Canine to Rescue

Albany, Or., April 18.—(Special to the Oregonian.)—The life of John W. Propst, a prominent pioneer of Linn County, was saved today by his dog, which succeeded in driving off a furious bull which had attacked him. Propst received serious injuries and though the experience is not expected to terminate fatally his recovery is by no means sure.

Propst was working at his farm five miles east of Albany when the bull attacked him and knocked him down. The animal is dehorned, but it rolled him roughly several times until the dog appeared and sprang at it. The dog finally succeeded in driving the bull away from the prostrate man.

Dr. W. H. Davis was summoned from Albany and found Propst badly bruised and suffering great pain. He suffered some internal injuries, the extent of which have not been determined yet.

It is certain that, had not the dog come to his rescue, Propst would have been killed, for he had been badly injured and was powerless to defend himself from the animal's furious attacks.

Death of a Linn County Pioneer

Mrs. Clarinda McKnight, a Linn county pioneer of 1852, died at the family home in Portland, on Friday, April 15, aged 76 years. The funeral occurred at the family burial plot, in Sand Ridge cemetery, near the family donation land claim home, on the following Sunday. J. W. McKnight, her husband, three sons, one of whom is Assessor McKnight and three daughters survive her.

Mrs. McKnight was a most estimable woman. The family settled on a donation land claim, four miles west of Lebanon in 1852 and passed through all of the hardships incident to the pioneer life. The pioneer home has never passed on the ownership of the husband, J. W. McKnight, and is located on the same section with the farm of the News family, both of which families were close neighbors, for years. The News extends sympathy to the bereaved husband, sons and daughters.

Albany Wants It

The fact has leaked out that Albany wants our condensery and overtures have been made to the condensery people to move the plant over there.

There is only one condition which will induce the condensery people to move the plant and that is for the people to continue refusing to supply the amount of milk required. As a matter of fact, the creameries are forced to bid up on cream throughout the neighborhood within reach of the condensery and whether the milker patronizes the condensery or not, he is benefitted in the price he gets for butter fat, because the condensery is here.

But should the plant be moved from here, which the condensery people will be forced to do unless a better milk supply is obtained, then people who milk cows will get less for butter fat and an industry which in time will supply 20 to 30 people, will be lost to our community. All the condensery asks is to give it a trial and if the farmer does not get better results from his milk than he can from the creameries, they are perfectly free to return to the creameries. But they should remember that the loss of the condensery means the reduction of 2 to 3 cents per pound on a square butter fat test.

A Shower

A "Shower," not of the aqueous fluid, which is supposed to descend in copious quantities, at times, during an Oregon winter, but a shower of useful articles supposed to be of use to a young couple just about to be hitched in double harness for life's journey, descended upon the home of Mrs. V. E. C. Peery and E. D. Philippi has concluded the purchase of 40 acres of land from T. A. Richardson, the purchase price being \$95 per acre. Mr. Richardson purchased this land two or three years ago at \$60 per acre. Messrs Peery and Philippi will probably cut this land into small tracts and place them on the market.
