## Died in Portland

John Ray, a former pioneer resident of Scio, aged about 76 years, died at a hospital in Portland, last Sunday morning. He was on his way from Prineville, where he had resided for five or six years, to his old home near this city. While in Portland, he met with an accident, the particulars of which no one seems to know, by which one of his legs were broken. Being without relatives or acquaintances there, he was taken to the hospital for treatment. His son George, with whom he had been living at Prineville, was notified and through him, another son, Herry, who lives on the old homestead, heard of the accident.

Mr. Ray was making the journey alone. His injury was such that he could tell but little about himself, or how he had been hurt. His death occurred as above stated. The body was embalmed and brought to the old home in the evening of the same day.

He is survived by two sons, Henry, of near Scio and George, of Prineville and a sister Mrs. C. W. Richardson, of Bilyeu Den.
