A Visit to Detroit

Last week the NEWS man made a short visit to this most eastern town of Linn county. It is, also, the last town going eastward on the line of the C. & E. railroad and is three miles from the end of the line and from here visitors leave the railroad train and embark upon one of the coaches of a pack train, if he wishes to visit the famous Breitenbush hot springs.

Detroit is but a small town, yet there is evidence of public spirit on the part of her citizens. A school house and a very neat I. O. O. F. hall with a hall for dancing purposes, public meetings, etc., beneath, constitute the public buildings. John Outerson is the proprietor of the only mercantile establishment which, by the way, carries a large and varied assortment of general merchandise, and who is the proprietor of the pack train as well. Mrs. Cooper, who conducts the hotel, will give you a meal so appetizing that you cannot help but eat and her rooms and general treatment of guests is beyond criticism. The streams and lakes, we were informed, furnish excellent sport for the angler and the adjacent hills and mountains fine deer hunting, in season.

Lumbering and logging for the valley sawmills seems to be the one and only business of the inhabitants. Hoover's mill on the east and the Mill City and Gooch mills on the west, send out almost a train load of lumber daily and S. V. Hall's two logging camps load several cars of logs.

The railroad in Detroit is the only public highway and railroad velocipedes and handcars are about the only private means of conveyance, if we except that means which has made Weston famous, a fact which the rounded condition of the railway ties furnish ample evidence.

Another peculiarity is, all residences front to the railroad and the second story is beneath in those on the river side of the road, causing one to have to go down stairs to bed.
