Judge Bilyeu—Clear off the brush, ditch the swales and cultivate the land. The town cannot progress faster than its environments.

Ed Daley—Clean up the town; induce men who have money to come and settle here and start up industries that we may have a pay roll.

Mayor Myer—Clean up the streets and alleys, paint the houses, develop the surrounding country, build good wagon roads and then a railroad will come.

W. M. Abbott—Scio needs so many things I scarcely know what to mention but I suppose the first requisites would be a railroad and good wagon roads and a general cleanup.

Fred West—Support your churches, morally and mentally illuminate.

Mat Gill—A good railroad.

F. J. Denny—In answering your question I would not dare to assume that Scio is not now on an equal progressive plain with other Oregon towns of its size, but conditions can always be improved, never perfected. Imperfect man will never be able to formulate perfection. Education precedes any and all improvement of what ever nature or kind, whether it be improvement in method of calculation, communication of thought or building of roads. If you wish to advance, if you wish to step forward to better conditions, foster education. For a collection of people as a town or city to progress any ways rapidly the people must act in harmony. OUR PORTLAND CORRESPONDENT

Portland's Harvest Festival Will Be Great Annual Event—Dates of Festival September 5 to 10

Portland, Ore., July 19, (Special). Portland's Autumn livestock show and race meet on the Country Club grounds will be known as the Harvest Festival, and the biggest purse ever offered in the Pacific Northwest for a single race will be hung up. It will be \$10,000 and will be known as the bankers' purse. Another, offered by the hotel men, will be \$5,000. Many smaller prizes will be offered and it is believed the festival will attract a larger gathering than any similar meet held in this part of the country.

James J. Hill will probably be the biggest attraction of the festival. A strong telegram of invitation has been sent him, which it is believed he will accept. It is planned to put the great empire builder on the program for an address.

Dates of the festival are September 5-10. The amusement end of the festival will be far more prominent than ever before. The attractions will be selected with a view to meeting the varied tastes of the multitudes in attendance and it is promised there will be a good time for all.

The interdependence of Northwest cities, one upon the other, and the good to be realized from the exchange of courtesies is demonstrated every little while. The latest evidence was at the time of the recent Salem Cherry Fair when Portland boosters filled a special train and made a neighborly visit to the Capitol City, taking in the Cherry Fair and making note of the progress of Salem since they were there last. This jaunt did everybody good, both those who went and the Salem people as well. Albany will have an apple fair this fall and Portland will do everything possible to make that a success. In return, Portland receives the support of the Valley cities at its Rose Festival and other times.

What is said to be the biggest event in the history of Coos County will be the Carnival to be held by Marshfield and North Bend in the week beginning August 15. A clam bake, the largest ever held on the Coast, is one of the features. There will be many amusements for the people and big illuminations of the Coos Bay cities and harbor. The arrangements now being made are on a larger scale than was ever attempted in the Coos Bay country.

Portland has organized a group of "Live Wires" that proposes to do things for this city. The membership is composed of those best fitted to be expert boosters for their home town, and the plan is to ginger up the city to an extent never before attempted.
