A VERY WARM SESSION AT THE FAIR GROUNDS

City Council, Monday Evening, Demonstrated
Some of the Members are Orators
—Three Members Oppose
Concession to Fair

It is hard to believe, yet it is a fact, that three members of the city council are disposed to block the Fair in the use of both lights and water, that is to say, the free use of the same during the Fair. Just why these three should view matters as they do passeth the understanding of most Scioans. Until the Fair people laid water mains and strung electric wires to the grounds, the city did not receive one cent of revenue from users east of the planing mills. By the extension of the systems the city receives a revenue of some \$75 per year and without the expenditure of a cent of public funds. The \$75 is clear gain to the city.

But a transformer for use during the Fair is necessary. The city has one or has to purchase one for city use and the Fair people wish to use it during Fair week. The three objectors want pay for the use of the transformer and for the water and outside lights at the Fair Grounds, as well. But the other four councilmen, who truly represent the people, voted to grant the wishes of the Fair people and all is serene.

When we know that the Fair is worth thousands of dollars to the people of Scio and vicinity and that it is the source of profit to no one except the concessionaires, it is, to say the least, a surprise to know that some of our citizens would cripple the enterprise, if they could.

However, it is well to know who our public spirited citizens are and this mixup at the council chamber demonstrates who are some of the people who, by their extreme conservatism, would hold back the wheels of progress in our city.

Take Down the Fences

Live On Common Ground

In the last few years fences have gone out of fashion. Oh, yes, of course! down South and in a few conservative places they still fence in the chicken yard and the flower garden. But as a rule you may travel the country from end to end and be able to count the fences you see on your fingers. One man's yard runs into his neighbor's, with never a dividing line between.

This is an outward and visible sign of a tendency of the times. We are doing away with fences in everything: in religion, in politics, in society. Think it over. Nowadays we often see the ministers and laymen of all the churches joining forces in some one cause. Our present anti-saloon agitation is an example. Or a bazaar is on for the hospital, and everybody helps—Catholics and Protestants, all the secret societies, the Woman's Club, and the bridge clan, Republicans and Democrats. Nobody wears a label any more. He is just a neighbor and a brother.

A number of influences have been responsible for this change of heart. It is not possible to say that this or that factor did it alone; only that "it helped;" but we must allow a goodly share of the credit to the Lyceum and Chautauqua movements. From the very beginning of the Lyceum in the anti-slavery days, it has been true to its purpose of tearing down the barriers of bigotry and prejudice. Its platform has been absolutely non-sectarian, non-partisan and "non-classical," to borrow the phrase coined by a resourceful club-woman. All sides of all sorts of questions have been thrashed out in the Lyceum in a thoroughly free and impartial manner. Lyceum audiences have learned to listen to both sides and draw their own conclusions.

This is one reason the Lyceum has helped so effectively in doing away with fences. Another is that Lyceum lecturers have been sounding the call to social service and brotherhood. They

The necessary annual repairs to the grounds will be completed this week, the big pavilion and restaurant tents are now in place and the auditorium tent will be placed next week.

The restaurant, this year, will be ample to feed all in a speedy manner with plenty to eat. The proprietor is an experienced restaurant man accustomed to feeding big crowds and the management feels warranted in saying that there will be no reasonable cause of complaint.
