Stand Up For Oregon

The "beast-machine" of Oregon has three hopes of escape from justice—from the people.

The first is through the United States Supreme Court. This is being worked with skill and money. Both the Grange and the State Federation of Labor are alive to this hope of the "beast-machine."

The second hope of escape from justice is the constitutional convention. With cunning and skill it hopes to fool the people into calling the convention. Once called the people are the meat of the "beast." There is no doubt about it. To help spring the trap a pliant governor is needed. Also a supreme court. The assembly scheme will help that out if it goes through. Once convened the convention will proceed to adopt a constitution to suit the "beast-machine." It will be said that the people will vote down the monstrosity. They will have no chance!

It is well within a little stretch of its powers to proclaim the constitution adopted with askingout leave of the people.

It has been done in recent years without exciting any resentment in the hearts of any "beast," without producing rebellion or civil war. It could be done in Oregon. All it needs is a constitutional convention.

The people have the say so now.

The third hope of escape from justice for the "beast-machine" in Oregon is the packing of the state Supreme Court. To accomplish this it may be necessary to make three slick motions. One is to elect two new members of the court faithful to the "beast-machine." Another is to elect a governor who will fill vacancies with "beast-machine" lawyers. Tested attorneys of Wells-Fargo, tried-out attorneys of the Southern Pacific. With one or both motions the Supreme Court can be captured.

What could it do? Why, my patriotic friend following the party name on a swill wagon, it could "do" the entire state of Oregon to a finish. It could do away with the initiative and the referendum. All the laws passed by the first two could be swept out of the way. It could confirm a constitution proclaimed without submission to the people. It could annex Oregon to the principality of the Southern Pacific and strike a blow at the progressive advance of the people for power that would start the "beast-machine" to further excesses all along the line.

Don't fool yourself, honest citizen. Don't fool yourself, Mr. Party-First-and-Country-Last. Something is doing in Oregon.
