COUNCILMAN EWING REPLIES

feeble effort to do the right.

The above defense of the action of the minority of the city council, by Councilman Ewing, does not explain away the fact that the city of Scio is the gainer by an annual revenue of \$75, which she would not get, had not the Fair association extended the water mains and electric wires at a cost of \$400 to \$500.

Suppose the city had strung these wires and had extended the water mains? The cost would be against the city and the interest upon that sum would be \$30 or more each year. This sum would be a fair pay for the use of public lights and water at the Fair grounds. Now if the Fair people have saved the city this expense, should it not be entitled to, at least, a part of the revenue the expense is bringing in? Mr. Ewing, also intimates that the Fair association is a profit earning corporation. Granting that his contention is true (which it is not), who gets the profit? Mr. Ewing gets a profit in that his bank gets the free use of several hundreds of dollars of Fair money for the greater portion of each year. Every citizen who owns property in Scio, reaps a profit through the increase of the rental value of his property. Ever farmer in this vicinity is receiving a profit, because of the increased value of his land. Every dairyman receives a profit because of the better quality of his cows, which the Fair has generated. The stockman is reaping a profit because of the better quality of his stock, etc. But the Fair association has not and cannot make a profit, because our charter requires that all of the earnings shall be expended in the maintenance of the Fair, paying premiums, etc., and the officers must serve without pay, except during the days in which the Fair is in session. Possibly, should the Fair association be disbanded and a division of the property be made, the grounds could be sold for a trifle more than was paid for them; but what would become of the four or five thousands of dollars expended in improvements there, which would be valueless for other purposes than a Fair. Oh, no. There is no profit, financially for the members, which these opposing councilmen would find out, if they were members; but there is a whole lot of hard thankless work, which all who have had anything to do with the management know to their cost.
