TRAPPIST FATHERS

MILL BURNS

Store and Lumber on the Yards Totally Consumed—Not Box the Cause

Wednesday afternoon word was telephoned to this city that the Trappist Fathers mill was burning. A number of people went up from this city to help, but too late to be of any assistance.

The fire started from a hot box, in the mill, and in a short time the entire plant was ablaze.

The fire has made a clean sweep of the plant. Mill, lumber and store room all went up in smoke. The loss is, perhaps, \$50,000, with no insurance whatever.

A few years ago there were five or six sawmills in the vicinity of Scio. The big lumber companies and the fire have destroyed them all.

Possibly We Are Guilty

Recent issue of the Albany Herald contained an editorial article, printed in pica type, in which the editor of the NEWS was given a severe (in the estimation of the Herald editor) lambasting and, also accuses us of the crime of being a democrat. But as there are worse crimes committed than that of which he accuses us of—being an assembly republican for instance—we suppose that we will have to grin and bear the indictment. But, let us see!

The NEWS has always advocated any and all laws which would bring government closer to the people. To this end, it used what little influence and ability it possessed, to secure the adoption of the initiative and referendum laws, the direct primary including statement No. 1 and, of course, indorses the recall. If this constitutes democracy, then we are guilty.

The NEWS has, also, applauded the actions in the past of insurgent congressmen, and views with satisfaction, the many insurgent victories at the late primary elections. Further, it would be glad to see the insurgent leaders in complete control of the destinies of that party. If this is democracy, then we are guilty some more. And should either Senator LaFollette, Senator Cummins, or even Theodore Roosevelt, be nominated for the presidency, the NEWS would gladly support him, unless it was sure that the democrats had nominated the better man. If this is hide bound democracy, then there are thousands of republicans in the same boat.

But the sum of our offending is our opposition to assemblyism and to assembly candidates, of the type lately named by the Portland assembly. But if this makes one a democrat, there are some thousands of republicans in Oregon who are tarred with the same stick and which our brother, to his sorrow, will find true in November.

The NEWS urged that the names of good men be selected to fill the vacant places on the democratic ballot and that these names be commonly understood at the various primary polls throughout the county. This was not urged until the time limit had expired in which candidates could file petitions for nomination. We believe the republican legislative candidates had to be supplied in the same way. This is not a serious fault of the primary law; yet we believe the law can be so amended that such exigencies can be avoided in the future.

But brother, we urge you as a matter of mental economy, to save your editorial eloquence for use during the pending campaign; for we feel sure that you will need it all and then some, if some of your assembly nominees are carried to victory in November. Yet, a little friendly criticism, occasionally, administered as a sort of counter irritant, is all right brother. It prevents one from placing a too high estimate upon his own abilities and, incidentally, upon those of his critic.
