F. J. Denny's Statement

Having been honored by the democratic voters of Linn county with the nomination for representative in the legislature, it is proper that I should make some statement over my own signature as to how I stand on the public question of the day.

Whether we realize it or not, the kind of government under which we live is of the utmost importance to every one. Our government will be good or bad, just or discriminating as we, the people, make it; or allow it to be made. Everyone owes an obligation to society and his government, for the conveniences, privileges and protection given him, and in proportion that that obligation is realized and acted upon, society will be good or bad.

I am in favor of a government of the people, by all of the people. Now we come to THE QUESTION confronting the people of Oregon to day, and it is this: Shall a PART of the people representing great wealth or ALL of the people rule.

There is an influence at work, backed by the big corporations, to make the individual voters vote of little or no effect (and their chief resource is bribery and deception) by setting aside or destroying our direct primary and initiative and referendum laws. Before our direct primary, with its statement No. 1, the individual vote counted nothing in electing United States senator, or if it did count anything it was less than one drop of water to a whole river. Until after the enactment of the initiative and referendum, what laws we got were mostly thrown in with the bargain sale of United States senator and the peoples vote did not count to any appreciable extent in the matter.

I am in favor of the direct primary election law, with its Statement No. 1, the initiative and referendum laws, because they add greatly to the power of the individual voter and decrease the power of the bribe giver.

The briber opposes those measures because they take from him much of his opportunity to use his money for corrupt purposes. The bribe taker is opposed to those laws because they spoil his trade. I, also, favor the recall and corrupt practice acts.

I believe in giving the common or public schools the best possible conditions. The stay of the government and free institutions is the enlightenment and intelligence of the masses.

I am opposed to the legislature repealing any law enacted by the people, or meddling with it in any way.

I register as a democrat, because I believe that I can have more influence for good government in the democratic party, than any where else. But no one should regard party more than principle or patriotism.

SCHOOL FUNDS

\$36,790 Put Into Circulation by Superintendent Jackson

Superintendent Jackson is sending out to the districts of the county \$36,790, on account of the October apportionment of school funds, \$1.50 from the county, with \$100 for each district. Following is what the principal districts will receive:

Testing Seed Wheat For Smut

The best treatment for use is, known as the formalin treatment. In applying it mix one pound of commercial formaldehyde with forty gallons of water. Clean the seed thoroughly to blow out as many of the larger masses of smut as possible. Then spread the grain thinly on the floor or place it in small piles and spray it thoroughly with this mixture, shoveling it over and applying more of the mixture until every kernel is thoroughly wet. Proper treatment will require three quarts to a gallon of the mixture to a bushel of grain. When this wetting has been thoroughly done, shovel the grain into a compact pile and cover with a canvas or blanket for two or three hours. Then spread out thinly to dry and shovel over frequently to hasten the drying process. The floor upon which the treating is done, the implements used, the bags in which it is taken to the field and even the drill should be treated with the solution to make sure that a thorough job is done. The grain will swell slightly from the water absorbed, a fact which should be borne in mind in setting the drill to get the required amount per acre.

The dipping method is preferred by some, but it involves more labor, and the sprinkling method above described will prove efficient if carefully done. When the dipping method is used the grain is immersed for ten minutes in the solution, being placed in a loose burlap sack for the purpose, a bushel or so at a time. After treatment it is dried and handled as above described, where it is sprayed or sprinkled. —Michigan Farmer.

New Oregon State School For the Deaf

The fall session of the new State School for the Deaf will open Sept. 28. The new buildings, for which the last legislature appropriated seventy five thousand dollars, have been completed and are being made ready for occupancy. Those formerly occupied have been transferred to the State Sanitarium for the treatment of Tuberculosis.

The new school plant is modern in every respect, and is most conveniently located in the suburbs of Salem, on a tract of fifty-two acres, on the line of the Oregon Electric and about a half mile west of the State Fair Grounds.

The object of this school is to educate the deaf children who come to it without language of any kind into, intelligent, self-supporting citizens. This is accomplished by means of both literary and industrial training.

Seven literary and five industrial teachers are employed. All the literary teachers have received special technical training for their work, principally at the training schools in Washington, D. C., Northampton, Mass. and Philadelphia. Great attention is devoted to the development of speech and speech-reading among the deaf in addition to the necessary instruction in written language.

Trades teaching is an exceedingly important part of the work, and this feature has been greatly strengthened in the last few years. The girls are given ample time and skilled instruction by special teachers in cooking, sewing and dressmaking; while boys are taught printing, woodwork, leather work, and for those interested, considerable attention is given to general farm and garden work.

The recent progress of the school is shown by the winning of the gold medal for general excellence of work shown at the Alaska Yukon Exposition, in competition with the state schools of Washington, California and Utah.

A majority of the pupils enter school not knowing a word of language, not even their own names, and the transformation of these pupils into intelligent young men and women and skilled workers, capable of independent, useful and happy citizenship, is truly marvelous. A number of graduates are successfully pursuing courses at the National College for the Deaf in Washington, D. C.

Through ignorance of the existence of the school, or misconception of its purpose and character, there are deaf children in many communities who are not sent to school at all, or are not sent at the proper time. Thus these children are compelled to lose many years of valuable time, and others are actually allowed to grow up to manhood and womanhood, ignorant, helpless, dependent, unable to express their simplest wants in verbal language, cut off from social converse, mentally and spiritually starved and stunted. Their very unnecessary plight is infinitely worse than that of the wholly illiterate hearing person, and surely no missionary, or social, or civic duty was ever more sacred than that of seeing that there are as few such cases as possible. Especially so, as the state provides free every facility for the prevention of such disastrous results. Equalization Notice
