He does not want the people to know that his individual scheming had so put up the assembly that the result was known even before that body met. He would like to have Messrs Wythecombe Smith and Ackerman forget that he so organized and filled the assembly with delegates friendly to himself, that they, one and all, were beaten before their names were proposed. Senator Bourne is not an issue at this time. Two years hence will be plenty of time to discuss whether the people want him continued in the office he now holds. The question now before the people is: Is Mr. Bowerman a man whom the people desire for governor and will he protect the primary law and statement One as he says he will? Owing to his extreme activity in promoting the assembly and filling it with his own delegates, some statement stronger than his word is necessary. The people will look upon the attack of Senator Bourne as a very cheap bid for votes.

Assembly Nominees

The republican representative ticket in this county, it transpires, is an assembly affair, an interesting thing for voters to remember. Just before the state meeting of the republican assembly convention in Portland the names of the delegates to the convention were published by the Democrat and other papers, and among them were the following:

P. B. Beatty and J. W. Miller, Halsey.

Mr. Beatty is the nominee for senator from this county, and Mr. Miller for representative. S. S. Train was not a delegate, but he wrote a warm letter in the Oregonian in favor of the assembly and against the anti-assembly movement. The Democrat is not informed as to Mr. Simpson's record on the question. L. E. Bean, the joint senator nominee, was a product of the assembly. There it is, full of assembly, an institution foisted upon the people at a time when another method was in practice. An effort was made by the last legislature to pass a law providing for these assemblies, but it was defeated, and in the face of all this these men are seeking an office too important to be trifled with. If elected it means that the direct primary law, an institution of the people, will be in danger, for they have put themselves on record, all of them but Mr. Simpson. It means also that the election of U. S. senator by the people as now provided for under statement number one will be in danger, for the assembly movement is aimed directly at statement number one, one of the most popular movements of this age.

The voters of Linn county should run no risks. This is not a time for jeopardizing these institutions of the people. M. A. Miller for state senator, A. A. Tussing, C. L. Shaw and F. J. Denney, for representatives, are all outspoken on these questions, and besides are men of such standing as to make their election needed in the interest of Linn county, as well as in the perpetuation of the direct primary and statement number one.—Albany Democrat

Scio now Has Signal Service

The Weather Bureau of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, has established a partial signal service station in this city and has supplied the necessary weather flags. Prof. Gooding has charge of the station and the flags will be displayed over the city school building. The flags are numbered and signify as follows:

No. 1—Square white, when displayed alone, indicates fair weather and stationary temperature.

No. 2—Square blue, when alone, indicates rain or snow, temperature stationary.

No. 3—Square, half white and half blue, alone indicates local rain or snow, stationary temperature.

No. 4—Triangular black, indicates temperature.

No. 5—Square white with black center, cold wave flag.

No. 1 with No. 4 above it, indicates fair weather, colder.

No. 2 with No. 4 above, indicates rain or snow, warmer.

No. 2 with No. 4 below, indicates rain or snow, colder.

No. 3 with No. 4 above, indicates local rain or snow, warmer.

No. 3 with No. 4 below, indicates local rain or snow, colder.
