He will let any one pick for him, picker to take half, or he will sell them on the tree at 25 cents per bushel. He says that not more than 4 per cent. of them are wormy and the buyer or picker can throw these out at the orchard, taking only the good ones. So there is no excuse for any one in this vicinity not having a bountiful supply of these best of winter apples for family consumption, during the coming winter.

Democratic Rally in Scio

Tomorrow, Saturday, October 22, should be quite a democratic rally day. The county democratic candidates will be here and address the people, commencing at 1 p. m. The NEWS is informed that these gentlemen are willing to divide time with their republican opponents at any or all of their meetings. The Albany Democrat in speaking of their meetings, last week, had the following to say:

"The democratic candidates are having good meetings on their tour of the county. At Brownsville the audience was a good one and the best of attention was given each candidate. At Holly they met a large crowd of voters. At Sweet Home they had an old-fashioned democratic meeting, the crowd being large and full of enthusiasm. Fair sized audiences met them at Waterloo and Sodaville. The most pronounced sentiment at all these meetings among democrats and republicans alike is opposition to assemblyism and assembly candidates. There is a disposition shown among anti-assembly republicans and democrats to vote for anti-assembly candidates. For that reason democrats will vote for T. R. Kay, anti-assembly republican, for state treasurer, Mr. Bingham, anti-assembly republican candidate for joint senator for Linn and Lane counties, and for Moore and McBride for supreme judges. Anti-assembly republicans in large numbers will vote for West for governor and Slater and King for supreme judges. There is much independence among the voters."

At 7:30 p. m. Senator George E. Chamberlain and Candidate for Congress "Josephine" Smith will address our citizens. These gentlemen are both eloquent speakers and will entertain and instruct the people about many things political, of which they are, many of them, now ignorant. The night will be light and the audience both afternoon and night should be large.

The British tramp steamship, Knight of the Garter, cleared from Portland the latter part of last week with the biggest cargo of lumber ever floated at this or any other port. It is stated that to produce this one cargo of finished lumber it would require 160 acres of the best standing timber in the Pacific Northwest. The destination of the steamer is North China, where a part of the cargo, consisting of very large square timbers, will be resawed by hand.
